MESSAGE FOR APRIL

During this month we will be thinking about Easter and what that means for us. For those younger, and I suspect not so young, thoughts will be of chocolate eggs. Perhaps we might think of Spring and the lighter and hopefully warmer days. With Easter comes Hope and as I write this we need a lot of hope in our lives.

We are in the early throws of Ukraine being invaded by Russia and hopefully now as you read this I hope that a peaceful resolution has been found. There is a lot of uncertainty around especially with the ramifications of COVID, poverty and fuel poverty. There is an increase in prices for things we would be able to buy a lot cheaper twelve months ago and this all adds to uncertainty. Still, Easter brings with it Hope! 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LOCAL HISTORY

From Local Historian David Craven

Halifax Guardian - Saturday, 8th November 1856

A daring highway robbery, which fortunately resulted in small profit to the thieves, occurred on Monday morning last, in Ovenden. It appears that Mr James Kershaw, Potato Dealer, of Halifax is in the habit of visiting several shopkeepers in this township with whom he does business, and so regular are his habits that in passing along the various roads and lanes he may be calculated upon almost to a minute. On Monday morning he had made a call upon a shopkeeper at Page Hill and then proceeded along an occupation road leading to Nursery Lane. In traversing the most lonely part of this road, and at a spot where the fence wall is broken, three men suddenly rushed out of the gap, and to knock him down, cover his face with a large sod, and fill his mouth with earth, was but the work of a moment. His pockets were instantly rifled, but fortunately he had received no accounts that morning, and the only money he had in his possession was 6 pence, which the thieves took. They also robbed him of a small bunch of keys, which they afterwards threw down in the road. Mr Kerhsaw was considerably injured, but managed to walk back again to the house he had left at Page Hill. Information of this daring deed was at once conveyed to Mr Nicholson, the Constable, and last Friday night he apprehended two young men residing at Ovenden, on suspicion of having been two of the three who committed the outrage. They were safely lodged in the lock-ups and will be brought before the West Riding Magistrates today. Their names are Timothy Gibson and Charles Cockcroft: the former is a woolcomber and the latter a moulder.

Halifax Guardian - Saturday, 15th November 1856

Greenwood Ogden, woolcomber, Timothy Gibson, woolcomber and Charles Cockcroft, moulder, all of Ovenden were brought up by Nicholson, the Ovenden Constable, on suspicion of being the parties who, on the previous Monday morning knocked down and robbed Mr James Kershaw, Potato Dealer, Halifax. The particulars of this daring attack were reported in last week's Guardian. Nicholson stated that Mr Kershaw was unable to identify the prisoners and he therefore asked the Magistrates to discharge them from custody. Cockcroft and Gibson were then ordered to be set at liberty, but Greenwood was charged with having been drunk at Ovenden. He pleaded not guilty. The offence, however, was proved by Nicholson and Greenwood had 15/6d to pay.

On Wednesday, 25th February 1857, at Halifax, two woolcombers named John Fearnley and William Sharpe, were committed by the West Riding Magistrates for Trial at the Assizes for a Highway Robbery with violence, which took place in that neighbourhood on the 9thNovember last. The prisoners belong to a gang of burglars and highwaymen, known as the "Ovenden Gang". They were apprehended a few days since at Hindley, near Wigan, where they were employed upon some railway works. At their trial the Jury acquitted both prisoners.

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



HOW TO HAVE SOME HAPPINESS THIS APRIL

'April is the cruellest month,' wrote T S Eliot at the beginning of his magisterial poem, *The Wasteland*. And it is a good description of what April may bring us, between the war in Ukraine and soaring energy prices.

But apparently, major problems do not mean that we can't enjoy anything. According to the 'science of happiness,' fuelled by advances in brain-scanning technology and a cultural shift towards seeing happiness as a key index in human development, there is a way through the deep gloom that hangs over this month.

Neuroscientists suggest that even while we are dealing with the big problems of life, we can also make room for 'small, fleeting moments of fulfilment'. These can range from holding the hand of a loved one, to appreciating the daffodils in your garden, to enjoying a cup of tea with a good friend. Such moments of quiet contentment are 'joyful vignettes' which can be the bread and butter of our daily human happiness. As one writer has said: "Hold on to the small moments and the bigger picture of gloom doesn't have to be as overwhelming as it first seems."

THE LAST PASSOVER

On the night before He died, Jesus ate His last Passover meal with His disciples. He then *transformed* the Passover into the *Lord*'s *Supper*, saying of the bread and wine that, 'this is my body' and 'this is my blood'. Jesus, the Lamb of God, was preparing to die for the sins of the whole world. John's gospel makes it clear that the Last Supper took place the evening BEFORE the



regular Passover meal, and that later Jesus died at the same time that the Passover lambs were killed.

Jesus then astonished the disciples by *washing* their *feet*. He said: "A new *command* I give you: *love* one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." His disciples were to love through *service*, not domination, of one another. In Latin, the opening phrase of this sentence is *'mandatum novum do vobis'*. The word *'maundy'* is thus a corruption of the Latin 'mandatum' (or command).

ALLIN THE MONTH OF APRIL

150 years ago, on 2nd April 1872 that Samuel Morse died. This American artist and inventor helped develop commercial single-wire telegraph systems and codeveloped Morse code.

125 years ago, on 3rd April 1897 that Johannes Brahms, German composer, piano virtuoso and conductor, died.

100 years ago, on 3rd April 1922 that Joseph Stalin became leader of the Soviet Union, in succession to Vladimir Lenin.

90 years ago, on 23rd April 1932 that the Royal Shakespeare Theatre opened in Stratford-upon-Avon, replacing the one that burnt down in 1926.

75 years ago, on 1st April 1947 that the school leaving age in the UK was raised to 15.

Also 75 years ago, on 16th April 1947 that the term 'Cold War' was used for the first time when American financier and presidential adviser Bernard Baruch described the relationship between the USA and the Soviet Union.

65 years ago, on 24th April 1957 that the first episode of the British astronomy series *The Sky at Night* was broadcast on BBC TV. It became the world's longestrunning TV series with the same presenter (Patrick Moore) until his death in December 2012. The series then continued with new presenters.

50 years ago, on 11th April 1972 that the first episode of the radio comedy panel game show 'I'm Sorry I Haven't a Clue' was broadcast on BBC Radio 4. It is still running.

40 years ago, on 2nd April 1982, that the Falklands War began when Argentina invaded the Falkland Islands. A British victory, although Argentina continues to claim sovereignty over the islands.

30 years ago, from 5th April 1992 to Feb 1996 that the Siege of Sarajevo took place, during the Bosnian War.

Also 30 years ago, on 15th April 1992 that the President of Afghanistan, Mohammad Najibullah, was forced to resign when his regime collapsed. Islamic rebels seized power on 28th April.

Also 30 years ago, on 23rd April 1992 that the world's largest McDonald's fast-food restaurant opened in Beijing, China.

Also 30 years ago, on 27^{th} April 1992 that Betty Boothroyd became the first female Speaker of the House of Commons.

25 *years* ago, on 5th April 1997 that the Grand National steeplechase was disrupted after the IRA sent coded bomb warnings. 60, 000 people were evacuated from the Aintree course and the race was postponed until Monday 7th April.

Also 25 years ago, on 13th April 1997 that the American golfer Tiger Woods, aged 21, became the youngest player to win the US Masters championship, and the first African American to win.

20 years ago, on 1st April 2002 that the Netherlands became the first country to legalise euthanasia.



GET GOING THIS SPRING!

One thing you need to put at the top of your list this Spring is to simply MOVE.

Whether you like gardening, cycling, jogging, walking or any other activity, make certain that you do some of it every day.

As Prof James Goodwin, of the Brain Health Network in London explains, "Only 25 per cent of our ageing – both physical and mental – is determined by our DNA. The other 75 per cent is lifestyle and our environment, over which we have a lot of choice."

He goes to explain that aerobic exercise indirectly stimulates the brain, and thus rejuvenates it. "Prolonged daily sitting down is the enemy of brain health."

Prof Goodwin also advises people to develop a healthy routine and stick to it. "Constantly varying bedtimes, drinking and eating excesses, and irregular habits are bad for you."

We are really thrilled that Calderdale Council have supported us in this way which will massively contribute to a whole new look to the clubhouse. Our players and members have been busy raising money too towards this transformation and again we are hoping this work will be done by the first match. There is still plenty to be done in Phase 2 at the end of the season to the remaining areas but the club has made an excellent start.

April is also the time we hopefully welcome new faces. We have a number of new players signed up already and we are hoping for another good season. New players, members and volunteers are always very welcome. The club is hoping to run a full complement of junior teams but help and new players are always needed. Come and have a look for yourselves at our facilities. The club will be open on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday evenings and we will be pleased to welcome you. Our junior training has been disrupted over the winter by the Covid aftermath with most of the indoor facilities locally closed but outdoor training for both juniors and seniors will start in April weather permitting and please look on our website for details.

75 YEARS SINCE THE SCHOOL AGE WAS RAISED

It was 75 years ago, on 1st April 1947, that the school leaving age in the UK was raised to 15.

This had been planned in 1939 but was delayed because of the outbreak of war. The Education Act of 1944 put it on the Statute Book, and it was brought into effect in 1947.

The same Act created the grammar school / secondary modern system, although grammar schools had existed for many years before that. The 1944 Act meant that 11-year-olds would sit exams to decide whether they were suitable for an academic or practical education. This was a good idea but poorly executed, which led to those not in grammar schools being regarded as "failures" instead of differently gifted; this was exacerbated by many from poorer schools who passed the exam not being able to take up their places in grammar schools.

In due course this imbalance led to the comprehensive system, with most grammar schools being abolished. The school leaving age was raised to 16 in 1972.

The architect of the 1944 Act, Rab Butler, pushed it through despite Prime Minister Winston Churchill's objecting to getting involved in all the intricacies and "party politics" of it in wartime. The main problem was the integration of church schools into the state system, which had been attempted unsuccessfully before. But Butler persisted, writing later that, having seen the Promised Land, "I was damned if I was going to die in the Land of Moab".

One result was the establishment of voluntary aided and voluntary controlled church schools, both of which had at least some of their costs met by the local authority, but differed in the amount of control the authority had. The Act also stipulated a daily act of worship in all schools – although it is still required, this rarely happens today.

23RD APRIL: ST GEORGE, OUR PATRON SAINT WHO ISN'T ENGLISH

The English have a patron saint who isn't English, about whom next to nothing is known for sure, and who, just possibly, may not have existed at all. But that didn't stop St George being patriotically invoked in many battles, notably at Agincourt and in the Crusades, and of course it is his cross that adorns the flags of English football fans to this day.

It's most likely that St George was a soldier, a Christian who was martyred for his faith somewhere in Palestine, possibly at Lydda, in the early fourth century. At some point in the early centuries of the Church he became associated with wider military concerns, being regarded as the patron saint of the Byzantine armies. There is no doubt that St George was held as an example of the 'godly soldier', one who served Christ as bravely and truly as he served his king and country.

The story of George and the dragon is of much later date and no one seems to know where it comes from. By the Middle Ages, when George was being honoured in stained glass, the dragon had become an invaluable and invariable visual element, so that for most people the two are inseparable. Pub signs have a lot to answer for here: 'The George and Dragon'.

However, it's probably more profitable to concentrate on his role as a man who witnessed to his faith in the difficult setting of military service, and in the end was martyred for his faithfulness to Christ.

The idea of the 'Christian soldier' was, of course, much loved by the Victorian hymn-writers - 'Onward, Christian soldiers!' The soldier needs discipline. The heart of his commitment is to obedience. The battle cannot be avoided nor the enemy appeased. He marches and fights alongside others, and he is loyal to his comrades. In the end, if the battle is won, he receives the garlands of victory, the final reward of those who overcome evil.

St George's Day presents a challenge and an opportunity. The challenge is to distance the message of his life from the militarism and triumphalism that can easily attach itself to anything connected to soldiers and fighting. The opportunity is to celebrate the ideal of the 'Christian soldier' - one who submits to discipline, sets out to obey God truly, does not avoid the inevitable battle with all that is unjust, wrong and hateful in our world, and marches alongside others fighting the same noble cause.

Discipline, obedience, courage, fellowship and loyalty - they're not the most popular virtues today, but that doesn't mean that they don't deserve our admiration.
