LOCAL HISTORY

From Local Historian David Craven

Halifax Guardian - Saturday, 10th June 1843

On Thursday night, or yesterday morning, some sacrilegious villains broke into I llingworth Church and committed depredations of the most wanton description, tearing the cloth from the pews, stealing the books, some pewter plates used in collections, the pulpit candlesticks, some joiners' tools and other property. We hope the thieves will not be able to elude the vigilance of the Constables.

Halifax Guardian - Saturday, 17th June 1843

On Monday, William Barker and William Binns of Clayton Heights, were brought up at the Courthouse, charged with having been concerned in one or more of the numerous cases of sacrilege, which have recently occurred. John Smith, Constable of Clayton Heights, searched the prisoners' houses on Saturday last and in Barker's house found a pair of trousers made of black cloth similar to that used for lining pews and a child's frock made of red cloth, similar in quality to that used as coverings for Communion tables. In Binns's house he found a pair of black cloth trousers and a child's red cloth frock of similar material, also some Bibles and Prayer Books, which latter property had been owned by a person named Barber, residing at Brighouse. Six yards of red cloth were taken away by the persons who broke into Illingworth Church, a short time ago. The prisoners were remanded until Wednesday.

Halifax Guardian - Saturday, 24th June 1843 - Committed to York Castle

William Barker and William Binns, charged with having, on the 26th May, at Brighouse, near Halifax, broken into the Church of St. Martin, and stolen therefrom a Prayer Book, two linen surplices, a stuff gown and a quantity of pew linings.

Halifax Guardian - Saturday, 29th July 1843

Crown Court - Monday, 24th July

William Barker 27 and William Binns 27, pleaded guilty to an indictment which charged them with breaking into the Parochial Chapel at I llingworth, in the Parish of Halifax, in the month of May last. The prisoner Barker, pleaded guilty to having been previously convicted of felony. Sentence deferred.

Crown Court - Wednesday, 26th July

William Barker and William Binns, who had pleaded guilty to a charge of sacrilege, in the Parish of Halifax, after a previous conviction for felony, to be transported for fourteen years.

500 years ago, from 9th to 17th March 1522 that Martin Luther preached his *I nvocavit Sermons*. He urged citizens to adhere to the core Christian values and trust in God, rather than using violence to bring about change.

175 years ago, on 3rd March 1847 that Alexander Graham Bell, Scottishborn American engineer, and scientist, was born. Credited with inventing the first practical telephone.

150 years ago, on 16th March 1872 that the first FA Cup Final was held at the Oval in Kennington, London. Wanderers beat the Royal Engineers 1-0.

100 years ago, on 10th March 1922 that I ndian independence leader Mahatma Gandhi was arrested and charged with sedition for his campaign of non-cooperation against the British I ndian government. He was sentenced to six years in prison but released after two years as he needed surgery.

80 years ago, on 8th March 1942 that the bombing of Essen, Germany, took place. It was the first attack on a German city by the British RAF following the Area Bombing Directive of 14th February, which authorised the bombing of civilian areas.

Also 80 years ago, on 25th March 1942 that Aretha Franklin, the Queen of Soul, was born. The American soul/R&B/pop/gospel singer was known for her many hit songs including *Respect* and *I Say a Little Prayer*. (Died 2018)

75 years ago, on 1st March 1947 that the I nternational Monetary Fund began operating.

70 years ago, on 11th March 1952 that Douglas Adams, British comedy writer and dramatist was born. Best known for *The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy* series. (Died 2001)

65 years ago, on 25th March 1957 that the Treaty of Rome was signed, creating the European Economic Community (EEC) which came into force on 1st J anuary 1958. It was renamed the European Community in 1993 and dissolved in 2009, having been replaced by the European Union.

40 years ago, on 3rd March 1982 that the Barbican Centre in London was opened. It is the largest arts and conference venue in Europe.

The building is now over 60 years old and unfortunately no element of it lasts for ever. We are in particular need of bringing the electrics up to standard and work will shortly commence on a total re-wire and replacement of the electrical fittings including a new fire alarm system. All these things are incredibly expensive but the club has been raising money towards it over the last eighteen months despite all the problems of Covid. Just recently we received incredible news that we were the very fortunate recipients of an anonymous donation of £5,000 which will go towards the cost of these essential works. We still have a shortfall to raise for the total cost of the scheme but the gift has given the club a tremendous boost and will enable the club to continue doing all it does to help the young people of Illingworth and North Halifax.

One other piece of exciting news is the selection of Alex Lees, a former Illingworth St Mary's CC player, as part of the England Touring team due to play three test matches against the West Indies

in March. We are all very delighted for Alex and the club has organised an electronic Good Luck card sending him our very best wishes for the tour. Here's hoping he becomes the next Illingworth player to receive an England cap.

We are hoping to arrange Junior cricket coaching and training sessions at a later date so watch our website for details.

As always, we want to get more youngsters, girls and boys, playing cricket and we shall be running our usual Friday night Junior activities from mid April right through the summer. Bookings have opened for our All Stars and Dynamos sessions starting on Friday evenings from the 7th May. Use the link from our website to book.

We are looking to run a full quota of junior teams in 2022 as well as three senior teams so there is plenty of opportunity for everyone.

Meanwhile there is still a lot happening round the club getting everything ready for the forthcoming season. Club volunteer work parties are planned to kick start the outside work on Saturday 2nd April and do all the usual pre-season maintenance jobs so as always volunteers are warmly welcomed.

27TH MARCH: MOTHERING SUNDAY, 4TH SUNDAY IN LENT

There is an old Jewish saying: *God could not be everywhere, and therefore He made mothers.*

Mother Church, Mother Earth, Mother of the Gods - our human mothers - all of them have been part of the celebration of 'Mothering Sunday' - as the fourth Sunday in Lent is affectionately known. It has been celebrated in the UK since at least the 16th century. During the Middle Ages, young people apprenticed to craftsmen or working as 'live-in' servants were allowed only one holiday a year on which to visit their families, which is how 'Mothering Sunday' got its name. This special day became a day of family rejoicing, and the Lenten fast was broken. In some places the day was called Simnel Day, because of the sweet cakes called simnel cakes traditionally eaten on that day. In recent years the holiday has changed, and in many ways now resembles the American Mother's Day, with families going out to Sunday lunch and generally making a fuss of their mother on the day.

'ANXIETY' COMES TOP

The word 'anxiety' has been chosen by children as how they would describe their experience of 2021.

Oxford University Press (OUP) asked more than 8,000 pupils, aged between seven and 14, to select a word from a shortlist of 10 words. The words were: anxiety, challenging, isolate, wellbeing, resilience, bubble, kindness, remote, cancelled, empathy.

The children were asked to choose which word they felt was most applicable to them. 'Anxiety' was closely followed by 'challenging', and then 'isolate'.

A SOLUTION FOR MIDDLE-AGED DEPRESSION?

Many middle-aged people struggle with a bit of depression and the vague feeling that they should be closer to their children. But not many middle-aged people turn to skateboarding, as a solution.

Yet a recent study by Exeter University has found that some older people who skateboard say that it has a 'spiritual meaning' in their lives, and that it boosts their well-being and happiness. It seems that skateboarding helps them meet a whole new community of people, and also gives them a new identity that remains separate from other areas of their lives.

As one professor explains: "Skateboarding provides a serious emotional outlet for people who have experienced personal trials in the collapse of long-term relationships, carer challenges, parenthood and substance abuse."



Perhaps one great advantage is that the sport takes it for granted that skateboarders will fall off many times, and so 'failure' is seen as perfectly acceptable.



1ST MARCH - SHROVE TUESDAY, PANCAKE DAY

Ever wonder why we eat pancakes just before Lent? The tradition dates back to Anglo-Saxon times, when Christians spent Lent in repentance and severe fasting.

So on the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday, the church bell would summon them to confession, where they would be 'shriven', or absolved from their sins, which gives us *Shrove* Tuesday. At home, they would then eat up their last eggs and fat, and making a pancake was the easiest way to do this. For the next 47 days, they pretty well starved themselves.

Pancakes feature in cookery books as far back as 1439, and today's pancake races are in remembrance of a panicked woman back in 1445 in Olney, Buckinghamshire. She was making pancakes when she heard the shriving bell calling her to confession. Afraid she'd be late, she ran to the church in a panic, still in her apron, and still holding the pan.



Flipping pancakes is also centuries old. A poem from Pasquil's Palin in 1619 runs: "And every man and maide doe take their turne, And tosse their Pancakes up for feare they burne."

Some people have noted that the ingredients of pancakes can be used to highlight four significant things about this time of year: eggs stand for creation, flour is the staff of life, while salt keeps things wholesome, and milk stands for purity.

Shrove Tuesday is always 47 days before Easter Sunday and falls between 3rd February and 9th March.
