#### The story behind ... ABIDE WITH ME

One of the most famous hymns in the world came out of Brixham, near Torbay, Devon, in 1847.

In those days it was a poor, obscure fishing village, and the vicar was the Rev Henry Francis Lyte. It was a discouraging place to be a pastor, but Henry felt that God wanted him there, and so he stayed, though it was lonely work, and he suffered constant ill health.

By the time he was 54, Henry had contracted tuberculosis and asthma, and he and his family knew he was dying. It would have been so easy for him to look back on his life and feel a complete failure. What had he ever much accomplished? And yet – and yet – Henry knew that in life it is not worldly success that matters, but how much we respond to Jesus Christ, and how much we follow Him.

In September of 1847 Henry was preparing to travel to the south of France, as was the custom for people with tuberculosis at that time. One day before he left, he read the story in the gospel of Luke about the two disciples on the road to Emmaus. They were met by Jesus on the day of His resurrection, and they invited Him to stay with them because it was getting late. "Abide with us", they said "for it is towards evening."

"Abide with us - for it is toward evening." These words struck a chord with Henry, who knew that it was getting 'towards evening' in his life. So, he sat down and wrote this hymn as a prayer to God – (the following are just some of the verses)

#### Abide with me

Abide with me; fast falls the eventide; The darkness deepens; Lord, with me abide! When other helpers fail and comforts flee, Help of the helpless, O abide with me.

Swift to its close ebbs out life's little day; Earth's joys grow dim; its glories pass away; Change and decay in all around I see; O Thou who changest not, abide with me.

I fear no foe, with Thee at hand to bless; Ills have no weight, and tears no bitterness. Where is death's sting? Where, grave, thy victory? I triumph still, if Thou abide with me.

Shortly after Henry wrote that hymn, he preached his last sermon. He was so ill he practically crawled into the pulpit to do so. A few weeks later, in Nice, France, he died, and so of course he never knew that his hymn would go on to become greatly loved the world over.





When parents of toddlers often browse social media, they risk damaging the development of their child.

A recent study has found that when mothers are on their smartphones, they talk to their toddlers only a quarter as much, give few opportunities for the child to practise conversation with them, provide a slower response to the child's explicit bids, and even sometimes ignore the child when the child really needs help.

As mother-child interactions determine the child's future linguistic development, vocabulary and self-

confidence, the study concluded that the use of smartphones by mothers can have "an adverse impact on the foundation of child development," which in turn may have "far-reaching" consequences.

#### **LOCAL HISTORY**

#### From Local Historian David Craven

#### Halifax Guardian - 14th June 1890 - Proposed New Street

The proposed new street between Crown Street and the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Station, and the following article, descriptive of the same, have been kindly furnished by Councillor Clayton.

It is admitted on all hands that the streets leading from the railway station to the centre of the business quarters of our town are indirectly, harassing to man and beast, and shabby in the extreme. In less than twenty five years the population has doubled in number, and the travelling public to and from the railway station, has increased enormously in those years. The Lancashire & Yorkshire Railway Company have increased their accommodation at the railway station, by the expenditure, it is said, of more than £100.000. The Halifax Corporation have been lavish too in their outlay of public money to improve and widen the streets of the heart of the town, and are now about to make further improvements at great cost. Yet not a shilling has been expended in making a creditable entrance thoroughfare from the station into the town, or even in improving existing ones. Both man and beast have still to proceed up Woolshops, or to climb the steep ascent of Horton Street. As regards the latter route, it has been facetiously remarked that in going into Halifax, you are going from Halifax, and although this is not strictly true, yet is nearly so, for a traveller into the town is but little nearer the Town Hall, after toiling up Horton Street, to Wards End than he was at the Station Yard. Some time ago Councillor Clayton, suggested a remedy for these evils, and a remedy which he argues will confer a great boon upon the town, and ultimately become a profitable undertaking to the ratepayers. It is no less than an entirely new thoroughfare from the station at the bottom of Horton Street, in a north westerly direction, across the Market Hall, and straight to the front of Crown Street, as shown in the plan, which will enable all to understand what is proposed, and to see what streets the suggested thoroughfare intersects, and what buildings and other places it crosses. It is a bold scheme, no doubt, writes Mr Clayton, and one about which much nonsense has been written and said; but it calls for serious reflection, for it is the only really efficient and complete remedy proposed for the evils complained of. As I said in my earlier communication on this scheme the Corporation own the greater part of the property required for this street, yet it is argued by some that the street will be too costly. A suitable main thoroughfare to a growing town can hardly be too costly. If its cost falls heavily upon the generation which effects its construction, that generation are perfectly justified in my opinion, in carrying over a portion of the cost to another generation. Besides, inefficiency is false economy, and often, perhaps always, leads to greater expenditure in the long run than would have been sufficed had the right thing been done at the right time. But I am of opinion the making of


this street will prove profitable to the Corporation, and it certainly will prove a great time saving scheme to the people, and a benefit to owners of houses. Compare the distances from the junction of Crown Street, with Corn Market, to the Railway Station:

via Woolshops and Square Road 565 yards via Southgate and Horton Street 627 yards via proposed new street 452 yards

Then take the gradients of the three routes:

Horton Street and Southgate 1 in 14 Woolshops 1 in 18.5 Proposed new street 1 in 21.85

It will thus be seen that the gradient is easier and the distance shorter by the proposed new route. The daily traffic will, therefore, benefit in both respects.



the book left behind at Mount Zion. There are forty five names listed, all of which are female and many of the names appear in the burial records of Illingworth Moor. The anthems are chiefly by seventeenth and eighteenth century composers, scored for soprano, alto, tenor and bass. This indicates the presence of a group of singers distinct from the larger congregation, as noted on the flyleaf: This Book belongs to the Society of Illingworth Moor Methodist Church for the

The manuscript contains 84 hymns drawn from a wide range of sources and representing several historical periods, and also includes some tunes by local composer Accepted Widdop. He was noted as an amateur musician and composer strongly associated with Methodism in the Halifax area, he is buried in St Mary's graveyard, Illingworth. On his grave, the words:

'Sacred to the memory of Accepted Widdop, of Ovenden, who departed this life the 9th day of March A.D. 1801, in the 52nd year of his age. He was a celebrated singer and the author of several volumes of anthems and many well-known Psalm Tunes'.

> Music, the noblest science known to man, Which angels honored long ere time began, Was his delight.

> His sweet seraphic lavs Will hand his memory down to future days, And he, we hope, in sweeter strains above. Now chants the praises of redeeming love.

## ALL IN THE MONTH OF SEPTEMBER It was:

1900 years ago, from 13<sup>th</sup> September 122 to 128 that Hadrian's Wall was built in northern England. It ran for 80 miles from coast to coast and marked the northern limit of the Roman Empire. The Roman Emperor, Hadrian, wanted to separate the Romans from 'the barbarians.'

200 years ago, on 11<sup>th</sup> September 1822 that the Catholic Church admitted that the 16<sup>th</sup> century astronomer Galileo Galilei might have been right about the Earth orbiting the Sun. The College of Cardinals reversed the Church's condemnation of his ideas. Galileo had spent the last nine years of his life under house arrest for publishing his work on the subject. He died in 1642.

80 years ago, on 10<sup>th</sup> September 1942 that the British Royal Air Force launched a massive air raid over Dusseldorf Germany.

70 years ago, on 6<sup>th</sup> September 1952 that the Farnborough Air Show crash took place in Hampshire. A de Havilland fighter jet broke apart and fell into the crowd, killing 31 people. Stringent safety measures were introduced to ensure it could never happen again.

65 years ago, on 2<sup>nd</sup> September 1957 that the Everly Brothers best-known song 'Wake up Little Susie' was released.

50 years ago, on 5th September 1972 that Palestinian terrorists invaded the Olympic Village in Munich, West Germany during the 1972 Olympic Games and took 11 members of the Israeli team hostage. All the hostages were killed, as well as five of the eight terrorists and a German police officer, when a rescue attempt failed.

40 years ago, on 14<sup>th</sup> September 1982 that Princess Grace of Monaco, formerly the American film and TV actress Grace Kelly, died in a car crash, aged 52.

30 years ago, on 7<sup>th</sup> September 1992 that the radio station Classic FM began broadcasting in the UK.

Also 30 years ago, on 16<sup>th</sup> September 1992 that the Black Wednesday sterling crisis took place. The UK crashed out of the European Exchange Rate Mechanism (ERM), raised interest rates from 10% to 15% and spent billions of pounds buying up sterling that was being frantically disposed of on international markets.

25 years ago, on 5<sup>th</sup> September 1997 that Mother Teresa, Macedonian-born/Albanian India nun and humanitarian died. She founded the Missionaries of Charity and was winner of the 1979 Nobel Peace Prize. She was beatified in October 2003.

## A THIRD OF REPORTS USING HAND CAR WASH APP INDICATE POTENTIAL LABOUR EXPLOITATION

One in three reports by motorists using a pioneering app to gather information on modern slavery in hand car washes have indicated potential labour exploitation, according to recent figures.

The Clewer Initiative's Safe Car Wash App, which allows drivers to respond to a check list of key factors that may suggest modern slavery or labour exploitation at hand car washes, has been downloaded 31,000 times since its launch in 2018.

Latest figures show 7,800 reports have been submitted using the app since the launch, with a third reaching a threshold of concern indicating potential labour exploitation.

Caroline Virgo, Director of The Clewer Initiative, said: "While many hand car wash businesses treat and pay their staff fairly, some are run by unscrupulous people, determined to make as much money as possible.

"It is therefore vital we educate consumers on the importance of choosing responsible car washes. The Safe Car Wash app is good news because it will help pinpoint and eliminate businesses that are exploiting workers.

"The Safe Car Wash app is easy to use – it asks a series of questions related to signs of modern slavery and if it reaches a threshold that suggests workers are not being treated appropriately, it will invite the user to send a report through to the Modern Slavery Helpline for further investigation.

The app was launched in 2018 by The Clewer Initiative, the Church of England's campaign against modern slavery, and the Santa Marta Group, the Catholic Church's anti-slavery project, with support from anti-slavery campaigners and other key agencies, including the police and councils.

#### GOING OFF TO UNI

This month thousands of young people will be preparing themselves for the exciting prospect of going off to what they all call 'Uni' in the autumn. Parents, grandparents and godparents will enjoy a mixture of pride and apprehension. This is a major step in life: leaving home, making new friends, study without compulsion and the heady gift of 'freedom'. Amazingly, the vast majority of students survive it and love it.

As for parents, there are a few basic rules that it is well to adopt. Firstly, don't get too involved in the choice of university. Modern students are a savvy bunch. They actually do talk to their teachers, and they know their way around the internet and social media. It's highly likely that they will correctly identify the 'right' course and place for themselves.

Secondly, be available (on the end of a phone) but leave them space to make the odd silly mistake. Make sure they carry on their person the number of a reliable taxi service, for that occasion when they find themselves in the early hours and far from their digs. Thirdly, don't worry about their being 'lonely'. The average student makes a friend or two in the first ten minutes of arriving in their digs – and sometimes it's for life!

Look forward to their coming home for the odd weekend, probably with some washing, but don't regret it when they go back. In fact, enjoy the experience at second-hand. And lastly, there's a lot to be said for a little daily prayer for them.

#### WHAT HOUSEPLANTS CAN DO FOR CARS

Common houseplants are your friend if your home or office is near a busy road.

A recent study has found that where houseplants are placed in a poorly ventilated room, they can suck up the nitrogen dioxide from traffic emissions by up to 20 per cent. The researchers at the University of Birmingham used peace lilies, corn plants and fern arums with good results.

Nitrogen dioxide is produced when fuel is burned, and so is present in car emissions. It can damage the respiratory system, making people more vulnerable to infections, lung disease, heart disease and asthma.

## GARDENING COULD SAVE YOUR LIFE - BUT ONLY IF YOU REALLY GET STUCK IN

A recent study has found that just an hour a week of digging and shovelling could be enough to cut your risk of dying. Such 'muscle strengthening exercises' has been found linked to a 10 to 20 per cent lower risk of death from all causes.

The study, recently published in the *British Journal of Sports Medicine*, also found that if you combine that hour a week of strength-training with regular aerobic exercise, you may even reduce your overall risk of an early death by as much as 40 per cent.

So brisk walking and cycling are great – but add in a bit of muscle building, too. Sadly, the growth in online shopping means we are not even carrying our shopping bags home from the supermarket as much as we used to do.

## WHEN THE CHURCH FIRST AGREED THAT THE EARTH WENT AROUND THE SUN

It was only 200 years ago, on 11th September 1822, that the Roman Catholic Church admitted that the 16th century astronomer Galileo Galilei might have been right about the Earth orbiting the Sun. The College of Cardinals reversed the Church's condemnation of his ideas. Galileo had spent the last nine years of his life under house arrest for publishing his work on the subject.

Galileo (1564 –1642) was a brilliant scientist and a pious Catholic. Albert Einstein called him the father of modern science, and he was one of the first to state that the laws of nature were mathematical. He was not infallible, however: his theories on tides were quite wrong: he described the idea that the moon influenced them as "childish" and "occult".

His support for heliocentrism, a theory that had existed since the Ancient Greeks, however, was spot on, but the consensus at the time – political, scientific and religious – held that the Earth was the centre of the universe, and that any other view was "foolish, absurd and heretical". That was the conclusion of the Inquisition in 1615.

Some 17 years later, Galileo published his theories, but unfortunately in a way that alienated the Pope, who until then had given him support as a scientist. He was tried by the Inquisition, who found him "vehemently suspect of heresy", forced him to recant, and subjected him to house arrest. It could have been worse.

The Cardinals' decision in 1822 was a bit late to help Galileo, but it represented a big shift for the Roman Catholic Church – though it was not until 1835 that his work was removed from the Vatican's list of banned books. And it was only in 1992 that Pope John Paul II conceded officially that the Earth was not stationary in the heavens. Eight years after that he apologised to Galileo for the way he had been treated.
