LOCAL HISTORY

The following was sent to the Editor by Mr John Kiddle.

WILLIAM BREAR

This man was prominent in St John's Church Bradshaw for many years

He was born at Cockhill Farm, Bradshaw on 14th October 1836. He was an illegitimate son of Sarah Brear born 1816. At that time he and his mother lived in the household of his aunt Mary Brear.

By 1851 he was a woolcomber still living at the same address in the household of his aunt Betty Brear who was probably the daughter of Mary Brear. Betty is shown as single and has no children. After the entry on the 1841 Census I can find no further details of his mother Sarah Brear.

There is no Census Form available for the whole of Bradshaw for the year 1861. I speculate that he inherited his Aunt's farm some time before 1867 when he became a Hay and Straw dealer. His first premises were at 1 Copper Street, Halifax

We know that he was a Hay and Straw Dealer and also a Farmer in 1871 when his address is shown at 17 North Parade. I believe there was a yard alongside 17 where he operated his business from. (For those who are interested North Parade began at the end of the new development in Broad Street on the left hand side towards North Bridge and the block of old properties in Northgate. It ran from there right up to Pellon Lane. It still exists today but in a form truncated by the flyover and its associated roads.) A little later William also had premises in the Northgate Inn Yard as well. (This is opposite the former Dews Garage and is shown by the large archway with two large blue doors. The business also included Removals by covered or open wagon.)

His business must have prospered because in 1877 he went into partnership with a Thomas Brown as a Brewer. Thomas Brown had previously worked at Whitaker's Brewery. They purchased the site of what we possibly would know as Maltings Brewery. The partnership built the premises which were on the right as you enter Hipperholme from Stump Cross. It has since been demolished and houses built on it. Brewing began, I believe, in the new Brewery about 1880.

By the 1881 Census he had moved to 26 North Parade and is shown as a Hay Dealer.

Things must have prospered as by 1891 he was living at Ovenden Hall, which he owned. (*This house is the very old dwelling, on the right in Ovenden Road, about 500 yards or so towards town from Shay Lane.*) At that time he had three sons of his wife's brother living with them. He is shown as a Brewer on the Census form.

By 1901 he was resident in The Grange as the owner. (*This property is located down the carriage drive just below the Queens Head Pub.*) The same three were living with him and his wife.

By 1911 he is still shown as living at The Grange again with family members living with him and his wife. He is shown as a retired Brewer. Leonard Ralph Braithwaite who was shown as a Medical Student in 1901 has left the house and his younger sister Ellen has replaced him.

Now to try and fill in some of the bits in between. To deal with the Brewery first. In 1905 they added a Wines and Spirits shop at 91 Northgate, Halifax. The company continued to trade until 29th August 1916 when they went into liquidation. The Brewery, the Public Houses and the Wine and Spirits shop were sold to a Bradford

Brewery for £95,150. Whitakers Brewery, whom some will remember as being on the right and left as you came out of town towards Bradshaw, expressed regret that they had not been consulted. There is no mention of Bankruptcy. I presume it was sold as a going concern.

We next move to his dealings in Bradshaw. He was a Church Warden at St John's in Bradshaw for at least 20 years.

In 1901 he had Rosemount, (*opposite the Church*), built but never lived there. I have not yet proved a date he moved into New Grange in Ingham Lane but can prove that he owned that from 1905. The Electoral Registers for 1913 show him living at The Grange, Illingworth. His qualification was being the Owner of a Freehold Farm at Bradshaw. No address given. This plus all the previous within this work would appear to show that the foundation stone on the Sunday School at St John's is in error in quoting his address as New Grange in 1888. I believe that the Inscription was carved at the same time as the memorial tablet in the Church. Although some time after his death, the Church of England's Crockfords Clergy register shows him as being one of

the principal landowners in Bradshaw in 1927. It is known that the family of one of those on our War Memorial were resident at New Grange for the 1911 Census.

The land upon which the St John's Sunday School was built was purchased from Mr Brear by the Church. Owning the land he appears as the seller and one of the Signatories of the purchase, as he was at that time one of the Church Wardens. The Sunday School was built in 1888 and the land purchased the following year at a cost of £75.

He was a Town Councillor and subsequently an Alderman for Halifax Corporation Illingworth Ward for many years. He was a Magistrate and then Chief Magistrate retiring in 1902. He was elected Mayor in 1899 and relinquished the position in 1902. During that year he laid the fundation stone for the Palace Theatre, (which was formerly situated at the corner of Southgate and Horton Street. Since demolished and replaced by Southgate House.)

On the death of his wife in 1919 a grave was made in Illingworth Church yard and he was also buried there later in the same year.

The Memorial in St John's Church was paid for by Consulting Surgeon Leonard Ralph Braithwaite in 1921, one of the Braithwaite family members who lived with him for many years. The Memorial was placed on the wall on the north side of the Church towards the front. A close examination shows it to be a wonderful example of the craftsman's art. What appears to be tiles is based on some kind of wood. A gentle tap reveals a board like sound.

It is interesting that William Brear began life at Cockhill Farm and ended his days living within sight of his birth place at New Grange in the lane at the opposite side and a little above Bradshaw School. In many ways a Victorian 'Rags to Riches' story.

Postscript: I have been unable to find a Probate Registry entry (will) for William Brear, but I do know that his Brewing Partner, Thomas Brown, left in excess of £444,000 when he died in the 1930's.

HOW NOT TO BE A GRUMPY OLD MAN (OR WOMAN)

Marvel. Marvel every time you see a child learning to walk and speak at the same time. Share in their delight. Wonder at the dawn of each new season: sunshine and shadows, falling leaves, frost, sudden new growth. You are still alive to take it all in. That's an unexpected bonus.

Appreciate. Have a look around your living room and concentrate on items designed for your comfort and entertainment, which your forbears never had. Think of someone you don't like; now ponder a couple of their good points. Try to desire their welfare more than their downfall.

ARE YOU ALWAYS A BIT LATE - FOR EVERYTHING?

Is this you? - late for work, late for friends, nearly missing trains and flights, late for lunch dates, late for dinner dates, and late for just about everything else.

If you are habitually late for almost everything, is it an actual mental condition? But some psychologists doubt you can just claim being late 'a mental condition'. Certainly, once we have got into the habit of acting in a certain way, we tend to do it long-term, unless we make a really conscious effort to change ourselves.

One common reason for lateness is over-optimism. If we are a bit too positive about our abilities, we may assume that we can leave at the last minute and still get somewhere else in time. We don't factor in any possible problems along the way. Whereas pessimists always imagine there will be problems with the journey, and so give themselves more time.

As we celebrate Mount Zion's anniversary, here is a very short history of its time, as what was originally known in Methodism, as a preaching house. I have taken the next paragraphs from a talk by Irene Cunliffe, who was one of Mount Zion's strongest advocates. She would have been saddened when we ceased to worship, but cheered by Mount Zion's new role as a Heritage Chapel.

Here is what she wrote: "A man called James Riley who lived in Bradshaw went to hear Wesley preach in Halifax on the 22nd August, 1748, his first official visit. He said "Wesley disturbed my conscience and troubled my soul."

From Riley's meeting with Wesley, he formed a group, a society, which grew and out of it a decision was made in 1772 to build a Chapel. The first building at Mount Zion was erected in 1773 and part of that was the cottage which remains. The chapel was rebuilt in 1815 and was a much bigger building. The first building was level in height with the cottage. On the 22nd April, 1774, Wesley came to preach. He records in his journal, "I rode and walked to Bradshaw House, standing alone in a dreary waste. But, although it was a cold and stormy day the people flocked from all quarters." The cottage afforded hospitality for man and beast – what is now the kitchen was the stable. William Walker in his publication "Told by the Dial" says that the diamond pane windows born many inscriptions by visiting preachers. One says "Time how short, eternity how long – C.W." In May, 1790 John Wesley paid his last visit to Halifax and preached at Mount Zion. He was then 87 and two friends assisted him and his memory failed. He died less than a year later.

Mount Zion has had a chequered history. Built in 1773 and rebuilt in 1815. All that remains of the first building is the sundial on the front of the building and the foundation stone in the vestry. On Wesley's death there was growing dissent in his Church which led to the breaking away of various factions. Secession came at Mount Zion which had been divided by some people following Alexander Kilham (1762-1798) and others remaining true to Wesley. The Kilhamites disagreed with the Wesleyans on points of Church Order and the importance of lay people in the Church. Usually the Kilhamites were ousted and set up somewhere else but at Mount Zion the Kilhamites ousted the Wesleyans who went to the barn across the road and then later built Illingworth Moor. Mount Zion became Methodist New Connexion. The New Connexion joined with the Bible Christians and the Methodist Free Church in 1907

and became the United Methodist Church. The Primitive Methodist began in 1807 and they followed an evangelical view point and met outdoors. They were known as the ranters. In 1932 all the factions joined in Methodist Union and became the Methodist Church."

Since 1932 much has happened, notably that Mount Zion became 11* listed in 1998. The most important recent event, is when we ceased to meet in 2013/14. We continue now as a Heritage Chapel for Circuit Heritage Mission together with Heptonstall. Today, a small number of enthusiasts continue to look after Mount Zion and we are always looking for more volunteers. We have a number of services throughout the year, Easter, Harvest, and a Carol Service as well as other ad hoc meetings. We have enjoyed visits from local schools who experience a Victorian Sunday. People appreciate Mount Zion for traditional weddings, still a peaceful place in the hurly burly of our modern world. It was:

Looking back at what I said in the last edition the weather over the last couple of months couldn't have changed much more dramatically. Previous drought conditions have changed to almost continuous rainfall with a scarcity of sunshine. Such is the British weather. From a cricket perspective we have just had to get on with it and at least we are well blessed in having plenty of covers to try and get matches on as best we can. And we have been able to play plenty of cricket although junior matches have been affected rather more. At least we need to be thankful that we have not faced the extreme weather conditions faced in so many other parts of the world.

All three senior teams have continued their very positive start to the season. The 1st XI are 2nd in the Premier League, 16 points behind Thornton and 19 points in front of 3rd place Bradshaw with 5 league games still to go. The 2nd XI are also 2nd in their Premier Division just one point behind leaders Blackley. The 3rd XI too are in second place in their league, 35 points behind leaders Low Moor Holy Trinity and trying desperately to finish in the second promotion spot.

There has been much Junior activity too with Under 9s, and 11s both taking part in the Halifax Junior League and building up to t

he Junior End of Season Presentation Evening in the clubhouse on Friday 8 September.

BUT WHEN THE SON OF MAN COMES, WILL HE FIND ANY FAITH ON EARTH? (Luke 18:8)

What an astounding gift from God our Christian Faith is! What a tremendous privilege! Given to us freely; our mainstay in times of trial and tribulation and source of great joy when we overcome those obstacles. Always there to fall back on in good times and bad. And with the promise of eternal life when we pass from this ephemeral life!!

Every individual Christian has been chosen personally, by God the Almighty Father Himself, to receive this amazing gift. As Jesus says "No one can come to me unless s/he is drawn by the Father" and "Yes, it is my Father's will that whoever sees the son and believes in Him shall have eternal life". (John 6: 40-45) The Holy Bible is the very bedrock of our Christian Faith - the roots of which are found at the time of Abraham in about 1850 BC. "The Lord said to Abraham, 'Leave your country for the land I will show to you, I will make you a great nation. All the nations of the earth shall bless themselves by you'. So Abraham went as the Lord told him. (Genesis 12: 1-5) And "I will make your descendants as many as the stars of heaven and grains of sand on the seashore". (Genesis 22: 17-18)

As a result of God's call, and promises of posterity, Abraham, at the age of seventy five sets out with his wife for an unknown land. To this unquestioning act of faith the Jewish people owes its existence and destiny. And not only his physical descendants, but also we Christians. As Saint Paul says "It is those who rely on faith who are the children of Abraham and receive the same blessing as he did" (Galatians 3: 1-9). Also "By belonging to Christ you are the descendants of Abraham, the heirs he was promised". (Galatians 3: 29)

Just as Abraham put his trust in God, so too, as Christians we put our trust in Jesus - God made Man.

Although the motives for Jesus' miracles are sometimes compassion, they are principally for the strengthening of faith. For example when two blind men approach Jesus and ask for healing, Jesus says: "Do you believe I can do this?" They said 'Sir, we do'. Then He touched their eyes saying "Your faith deserves it, so let this be done for you'. And their sight returned". (Matthew 9: 27-31) Again when Jesus turns the water into wine at the wedding feast in Cana, we read: "Jesus let His glory be seen and His disciples believed in Him" (John 2:1-12) The faith that Jesus asks for throughout his Ministry is the act of trust and self abandonment by which people rely not on their own abilities but on the power and guiding word of Himself. A prime example of what he asks is when a Centurion pleads with Jesus to cure his paralysed servant who is at his home, Jesus says, "I will come myself and cure him". The Centurion replied, 'Sir, I am not worthy to have you under my roof, just give the word and my servant will be

cured.' Jesus was astonished and said 'Nowhere in Israel have I found faith like this'. And to the Centurion 'Go back then, you have believed so let this be done for you. And the servant was cured at that moment'. (Matthew 8: 5-13) However, as Christians it is not enough to say we have faith in Jesus. No matter how strong it may be, we must also follow His teachings, by doing good works and having our neighbours, as Saint Paul puts it: "If I have faith to move mountains, but am without love it will do me no good whatsoever". (1 Corinthians 13: 1-3)

Saint James puts it another way: "I will prove to you that I have faith by showing you my good works - now you prove to me that you have faith without any good deeds to show....faith without good deeds is useless". (James 2: 14-23) This is entirely in keeping with the teaching of Jesus. We read: "Lord, when did we see you hungry, or thirsty, a stranger or naked, sick or in prison, and did not come to your help? Then He will answer "I tell you solemnly, in so far as you neglected to do this to one of the least of these, you neglected to do it to me', and they will go away to eternal punishment and the virtuous to eternal life". (Matthew 25: 31-46)

My dear sisters and brothers even if we have strong faith, and good works, it is still possible to doubt, or even lose our faith - perhaps caused by some personal trauma like losing a loved one, illness, financial problems or looking at the bad things that are happening in the world of today. However we should not despair. Even Christ's closest friends lost their faith in Him and ran away, in the garden of Gethsemane when Jesus was arrested, as He had foretold at the Last Supper. "You will all lose faith in me this night". With Peter even denying Him three times! (Matthew 26: 30-35) We can take heart from the fact that they regained their faith and are all now great saints.

It is in times of doubt, or if our faith falters, that the warm strong faith of others in our Christian communities is invaluable. They become for us the oxygen that keeps the failing flame of our faith from being extinguished. As St Paul says "Faith leads to faith". (Romans 1: 16-17)

My dear brothers and sisters, although our faith cannot be obtained by our own merits, as it is a gift that only the Father can give, as mentioned earlier, it can be strengthened and deepened by such things as reading the Holy Bible, looking at the lives of the Saints, attending Church, praying - which is an act of faith in itself - performing good works or, learning from others and their experiences. And we can also look forward to that great day that Jesus promises us when "I shall return to take you with me, so that where I am you may be too". (John 14: 1-3) Which brings us back to where we started "But when the Son of Man comes will He find any faith on earth?" (Luke 18: 8) This particularly applies to those who profess to have faith in Jesus - after all it was the Religious leaders of His own people who, through their Satanic sins of Pride, Arrogance and Envy rejected Christ the first time round. (Matthew 23: 1-12 and 27: 18) And they too professed to have faith!!
