#### MESSAGE FOR APRIL

I must admit I am a bit partial to chocolate and Easter eggs. As we have just left the Easter period at the end of March I wonder what kind of Easter you had. Or perhaps another question would be what does Easter mean to you?

From a Christian perspective it is less about chocolate eggs and bunnies and more about a cross, an empty grave and a guy called Jesus. The reason for the eggs and bunnies and spring flowers are to do with being a symbol of new life. For those with a Christian faith, like myself, it is about sacrifice and love and paying a debt on our behalf.

Jesus' only true purpose was to die in our place for the things we do wrong, which I'm sure all of us can agree that we do at some point in our lives. Often, we don't fully grasp the love that God has for us and how special we are. God demonstrated that love by Jesus giving his life on a cross and enabling our relationship with God to be put right.

I began by asking what kind of Easter you had. I hope you had a good one and that you felt loved and at peace.



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# ST GEORGE OF THE GOLDEN LEGEND

St George is Patron Saint of *England*, but he never actually came here. He was a Christian officer in the Roman army under Diocletian, who refused to abandon his faith during the Terror. George was therefore martyred in **Palestine** about 300 AD. His courage became legendary, and St George became the example of a Christian fighting-man, a powerful helper against evil powers affecting individual lives.

He was the *soldier-hero* of the Middle Ages. In the *Golden Legend* of the 13th century, Jacobus de Voragine tells the story of how St George helped rescue the people of Sylene in Lybia from a *dragon*, especially the *princess*, who had been offered to the dragon as a sacrifice. With the dragon dead, and the princess returned to her father the King, the people of Sylene *converted* to Christianity.

#### LOCAL HISTORY

Editor: This month's Local History is taken from the Halifax Courier dated December 1974 when Mrs Eve Chapman wrote 'Nowt like it these days:

#### TREASURE IN THE LOWER MARKET

Bit by bit old Halifax is being whittled away, and memories become talking points for the older folk. A few days ago I heard one say, "Nowt like t'Low Market theeas days, you could got oomost owt you wanted down there."

Soon, I suppose, we shall all have forgotten the Lower Market yet it was a treat for youngsters as well as their parents, providing entertainment as well as bargains. Rarely was the market given its correct name, it was always t'Low Market, and as a child I always thought it meant "low" in the social, rather than geographical sense, probably because we were normally forbidden to go there. Naturally we went whenever we could, for its spicy smalls, and brilliant flares lighting the stalls (no electricity or gas then) were a great attraction, especially on cold days when we had nowhere else to go.

The first sight everybody remembers at the left hand entrance was the brazier on which black puddings endlessly boiled in a copper pan. On chilly days we would gather round the glowing fire until chased away by the stall keeper. I always thought I'd like to try a black pudding, but either lacked the necessary coppers or the courage to explore the mystery behind that shiny skin.

The trip stall was beside the brazier, with a great variety of tripe: honeycomb looked, to me, the most interesting. I'd never seen a real honeycomb then, but my grandma had an honeycomb quilt and the trip looked just like it. Then there was "thick seam" which our granddad loved, and some peculiar stuff, darkish greybrown which we called "dishclouts" and we couldn't imagine anybody wanting to eat this. On the same stall was stuff called "uther" or by the truly refined "elder" - it was many years before I knew what part of the cow that came from!

Tremendous stone jars of pickled onions and pickled red cabbage offered small portions for a penny or so, to any who brought their own jam jars to fill, an experience I often saw but never shared.

As a great reader I was fascinated by the second hand book stall in the market. There were old Sunday school prizes, Silas K. Hocking and Annie S. Swan, with the tales of poverty and endurance which made us seem part of an affluent society. But it was the magazines I coveted: the girls' paper "School Friend" where Bessie Bunter grew as fat as her famous brother Billy at Greyfriars. Nor were we against buying the "Gem" or the "Magnet" when we had the coppers; these transported us into a world of boarding schools and wild adventures which we found thrilling. We weren't allowed to buy sweets in the Low Market. Our weekly ration came with the groceries from the Co-op and was doled out from a tin canister as long as the contents lasted. It seemed a pity when the man in the Market was positively giving them away!

He would pile up a bar of chocolate, add some boiled sweets and a bag of toffee. "All this lot for fourpence," he'd yell, and then, "Nay, it's my birthday, so I'll do

better'n that, I'll give you a stick of rock an' all." Eager hands would stretch out for the "bargain" parcel. We tried to educate our mother, but she had one stock answer "It's rubbish!"

The biscuit stall drew us too, for sometimes there were bags of broken biscuits very cheaply, and we would spend our pennies on these. My young brother once was chased by an irate stall-holder when an older boy had put him up to mischief. The big lad told him to go and ask for broken biscuits, and if the stall keeper said he hadn't any, he was to say"Well break some then!" The big lad had vanished when the little one said his piece and was chased!

There were many of these harmless jokes - I expect shopkeepers expected them - such as the laddie who asked if they kept ice buns, and when told they did he said "Well go skate on 'em then!"

The oilcloth salesmen, too, were often comical, slapping their huge rolls "All guaranteed linoleum, ladies! With the course jokes, though housewives rarely took the words at face value!

Just occasionally we were in the Low Market quite legally, for mother was an inveterate snapper-up of remnants and fents of cloth. Every weekend you could see women picking up ends of discarded rolls, "Just enough for a frock for Jessie, or a pair of trousers for Joe."

The pots and hardware stall had an entertainment of its own too. It sold everything from children's mugs, to chamber-pots and tea services. The sales technique was simple! The salesman gathered a crowd by sheer force of personality cracking jokes and offering ever-decreasing prices.

Finally, if there were no takers at his intended price, he would yell, "I'll smash 'em afore I'll let you 'ave 'em for nowt!" With a mighty crash down would go the dish or whatever it was, and we never suspected he had a cracked one, ready for that moment.

The fruit stalls were always cheaper than elsewhere, even if the quality might be a little suspect. Who cared if bananas were turning brown when they were to be eaten quickly! The bad parts of apples and oranges could be cut off for immediate consumption. We weren't too fussy in those days!

But at Christmas the stalls of the greengrocers were a real joy - especially the red apples, polished like mirrors, and a special variety called "Snowflake." These were slightly tinged with red on the inside, and the salesman would cut one open occasionally, slice it up and hand out quarters to the crowd to prove its quality. It was in the Low Market, too, where we renewed our stock of ornaments for the Christmas tree, glorious coloured bubbles, pipes, spangles and fairies, for although the trimmings were put away carefully each January there was always a slight breakage.

The Low Market - truly evocative in many people's minds of good natured, if a little rough, fun and value for money in a day when most people had very little margin to spare.





# GOD CREATED MAN IN THE IMAGE OF HIMSELF MALE AND FEMALE HE CREATED THEM (Genesis 1:27)

The Biblical principle that affirms that all people are created equal; thus affirming the dignity of every human being, is based on the above. As such they all have equal right and responsibilities before Him.

This premise of all being equal is repeated on numerous occasions, in a variety of forms, throughout the Holy Bible.

For example: "The Lord your God is God of gods, never partial, never to be bribed." (Deuteronomy 10:17) This is picked up in the New Testament by Saint Peter. "The truth I have now come to to realise is that God does not have

favourites." (Acts 10 : 34-35) Saint Paul echoes this in (Romans 2 : 11).

God, speaking through Isaiah says "Is not this the sort of fast that pleases me, to break unjust fetters and undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free and break every yoke." (Isaiah 58: 6-9)

Saint Paul says: "All baptised in Christ there are no more distinctions between Jew and Greek, slave and free, male and female, but all of you are one in Christ." (Galations 3: 27-28)

By extension this applies to all peoples, as Saint Paul further explains: "There is one mediator between God and man, Christ Jesus who sacrificed himself to win freedom for all mankind." (1 Timothy 2: 2-6)

Saint James says: "As soon as you make distinctions between classes of people, you are committing sin." (James 2: 8-9)

All of this is summed up in the great law of Scripture, as spoken by The Father "You must love your neighbour as yourself" (Leviticus 19: 18) and as spoken by Jesus "Love one another; just as I have loved you, you also must love one another." (John 13: 34-35)

From a Divine perspective the premise that all people are equal is most certainly true; but for a large majority of the human race that same premise is most certainly NOT true.

The following is taken from reputable sources on the Internet by such authorities as the United Nations:

Upwards of 71% of the global population are effected, one way or another, by inequality and it is getting worse.

The main categories of inequality are:

- Wealth which is the unfair distribution of assets and resources;
- Income which is the unequal distribution of money;
- Political which is the unequal treatment and representation of citizens before the law;
- Life unequal opportunities of such things as education, health and
- Membership unequal recognition due to race; gender (includes LGBT); religion; enthnicity; and colour.

The above unequal treatment of people is an abomination in the eyes of God the Almighty Father and a disgrace to humanity, for it deprives them of their

personal rights; impinges on the God-given gift of free will. In short they are a form of slavery.

As Christians we should be promoters of equality, unity, justice, peace, freedom and human rights. However, before we can go out to others we need to put our own house in order first, by showing a united front to the rest of the world, in order to be a convincing role model for others to follow.

The one single factor that would draw all Christians closer together, and cancel out our own unfair treatment of women, would be to fully admit women into the ranks of the priesthood/clergy (as some denominations have already done). This would create an unbreakable bond between the various denominations and also open up the flood gates on a reservoir of spirituality, with greater insights, new vitality, holiness and a life-saving spirituality that will water the whole world. Giving new birth and new growth, as the profoundly diverse experience of women combines with, and balances, that of men. As together they preach The Good News to a divided world that is thirsty for peace, justice, equality and badly in need of God. Saint Paul says "Never try to suppress the Spirit." (1 Thessalonians 5:19)

This solidarity between Christians would also fulfil what Jesus prayed for: "I pray not only for these (the Apostles), but for those also who through their words will believe in me. May they all be one, Father, may they be one in us, as you are I in me and I am in you, so that the world may believe it was you who sent me." (John: 17: 20-21)

# STRICT BEDTIMES COULD MAKE CHILDREN'S BRAINS 'BIGGER AND HEALTHIER'

A family routine and a strict bedtime could help your child develop a healthier, bigger brain.

On the other hand, a disruptive family life with poor sleep patterns could mean your child has slower brain development, poorer cognitive function, and below average academic achievement.

Those are the findings of a new study from Colorado State University. It found that children thrive when the family has a weekly 'family time' together, when homework is done at the same time every day, the family eats dinner together every night, the child is expected to carry out regular household chores, and when bedtime is at a consistent time, accompanied by a bedtime story or similar calming ritual.

The underlying need is for the child to get enough regular and deep sleep. Children with disrupted families get disrupted sleep, and therefore are more likely to have thinner regions of the brain in the amygdala as well as parts of the left and right frontal cortex. These areas control skills related to language, behaviour, sensory perception, and emotional processing.

#### DO YOU REMEMBER YOUR OWN PIN NUMBER?

Nearly one in five of us can't. We are so used to paying by contactless that when we

have to withdraw cash or type our PIN into a card reader, our minds go blank.

'Contactless' normants hit a record high last year. A staggaring

'Contactless' payments hit a record high last year. A staggering 93.4 per cent of all in-store card transactions up to £100 was made using contactless, rather than cash or PIN and card reader.

According to Barclays, we now depend on contactless payments and smartphone technology so much that more than a fifth of young people now leave their wallets at home when they go shopping.

Contactless technology was first introduced by Barclaycard 17 years ago. It had a spending limit of £10. The limit was increased during the pandemic, to reduce physical contact in shops, rising to its current £100 limit.

#### DON'T HESITATE TO USE HEARING AIDS

Here is something you didn't expect: using hearing aids if you are a bit deaf can be of great benefit to your overall health.

Crystal Rolfe, director of health at the Royal National Institute for Deaf People (RNID) said: "Hearing aids bring enormous benefits for people with hearing loss. Research shows that wearing hearing aids may reduce the risk of cognitive decline, and it is well known that they have positive effects on physical, social, emotional, and mental wellbeing.

According to hearing loss charity RNID, 12 million adults in the UK are deaf, have hearing loss or tinnitus and an estimated seven million people could benefit from hearing aids, but only about two million use them.

The researchers hope the findings, published in The Lancet Healthy Longevity journal, will encourage more people to wear hearing aids. As one doctor said: "If you have hearing loss, get hearing aids. The benefits could be limitless."

#### THE PET CRISIS

More than half of us in the UK own a pet. That is 17 million households.

But we are abandoning them at an alarming rate. The RSPCA warns we are offloading our animals at "unmanageable levels," and stretching their welfare services to the limit.

The turning point was the pandemic. Stuck at home during lockdown, we went animal-mad, and our pet dogs soared from nine million in 2019 to 13 million in 2022.

But four million puppies purchased during the pandemic was not a good idea. Since then, a fifth of all those puppies have been reported as having behavioural problems such as clinginess, aggression, or being very hard to train.

On top of that, the cost-of-living crisis has left many people struggling to even feed their pet. According to the Office for National Statistics, the cost of owning a dog is estimated to have jumped by 12.8 per cent – around £256 – over the past year to total around £2,500.

All in all, it is the 'perfect storm'. The RSPCA received 20,999 reports of abandoned animals last year. That is 5,000 more than in 2020.

#### ALL IN THE MONTH OF APRIL

#### It was:

200 years ago, on 19<sup>th</sup> April 1824 that Lord Byron died. One of the greatest British poets and a leading figure in the Romantic movement, he died of sepsis/fever while fighting for Greek independence from the Ottoman Empire. Aged 36.

175 years ago, on 10<sup>th</sup> April 1849 that American mechanic Walter Hunt was granted a US patent for his invention of the safety pin. He immediately sold the rights for \$400, which is about \$12,000 today. The company he sold it to made millions from it.

150 years ago, on 5<sup>th</sup> April 1874 that Johann Strauss II's operetta Die Fledermaus was performed for the first time, in Vienna.

100 years ago, on 17<sup>th</sup> April 1924 that Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Studios (MGM) was founded when Metro Pictures, Goldwyn Pictures and Louis B Mayer Pictures merged.

Also 100 years ago, on 23<sup>rd</sup> April 1924 that the British Empire Exhibition opened in Wembley, London.

90 years ago, on 3<sup>rd</sup> April 1934 that British inventor Percy Shaw patented the Cat's Eye reflective road stud. He set up a company to manufacture them in 1935 and in 1937 he was awarded a government contract to mass produce them for national use.

75 years ago, on 7<sup>th</sup> April 1949 that the Rodgers and Hammerstein musical South Pacific was opened in Broadway.

70 years ago, on 26<sup>th</sup> April 1954 that the Soviet Union transferred Crimea from Russia to Ukraine. In 2014 Russia annexed Crimea, but it is not recognised internationally, and a number of sanctions were imposed on Russia as a result.

60 years ago, on 15<sup>th</sup> April 1964 that twelve men convicted of carrying out the Great Train Robbery in England in August of 1963 were jailed for a total of 307 years. They were given some of the longest sentences in British criminal history.

50 years ago, on 6<sup>th</sup> April 1974 that the Swedish pop group ABBA won the Eurovision Song Contest with their song Waterloo. It was the first time that Sweden won the contest. ABBA went on to be one of the most successful groups in music history.

40 years ago, on 17<sup>th</sup> April 1984 that British police officer Yvonne Fletcher was shot dead during a demonstration outside the Libyan Embassy in London. This led to an 11-day siege by the police.

20 years ago, on 1st April 2004 that Google launched its free email service, Gmail.

10 years ago, on 14<sup>th</sup> April 2014 that the Boko Haram Islamic terrorist group kidnapped 276 female students from the Government Girls Secondary School in Chibok, Nigeria. Some of the girls escaped, some were rescued, or have been reported dead. But over 100 are still missing, fate unknown.
