MESSAGE FOR DECEMBER / JANUARY

I need to alert you to a danger. It regards those tinsel-clad angels, tea-towel covered shepherds and snowy stable. The danger is to restrict Christmas to nativity plays and nothing beyond. Now don't get me wrong, I like nativity plays, and I've attended a fair few. They are wonderful, but by their very nature they tend to soften the rough edges of that first Christmas. In contrast, the Gospel accounts of Christ's birth describe all of life. There is an unexpected teenage pregnancy, homelessness and a vulnerable family fleeing violence. The dark side of our human nature is also revealed: hatred and deceit, which will lead ultimately to Herod's pathological rage and murder.

It seems to me that we are all in the danger of softening Christmas and removing its earthiness. Take the shepherds who St Luke says, were 'living out in the fields nearby' - tough men whose faces would have been hardened by years of weather; who could light a fire in a gale; and were used to blood and amniotic fluid. At the edge of society, and very different from the itinerant, wealthy Magi, the shepherds were among the poor. Yet, they were the first to be invited to see the Christ, while the religious establishment figures, like me, were not.

And this is where the story of Jesus' birth gets more challenging. If we who celebrate Christmas in 2024 fail to show compassion and inclusion for those at the edge of our society, then we fail to remember a central message of Christmas. But if we linger within the Bible passages, then they begin to yield profound insight into our quest for peace and justice. These 2,000-year-old words live, because they start to change how we think and how we behave.

The choice is ours: to confine Christmas to nativity plays, or we can wrestle with what the Gospel writers were saying. Within their words there is wisdom and truth about the human condition. Most importantly, they point to the author of Life, Light & Love. It is what Charles Wesley succinctly encapsulated in verse:

Hail the heaven-born Prince of Peace!
Hail the Sun of Righteousness!
Light and life to all He brings,
risen with healing in His wings.
Mild He lays His glory by,
born that man no more may die,
born to raise the sons of earth,
born to give them second birth:
Hark! The herald-angels sing,
"Glory to the new-born king!"

I wish you a Christmas full of Joy & Peace.

One story of his generosity explains why we hang Christmas stockings over our mantelpieces today. There was a *poor family* with *three daughters* who needed dowries if they were to marry, and not be sold into slavery. Nicholas heard of their plight, and tossed three bags of gold into their home through an open window – thus saving the girls from a life of misery. The bags of gold landed in *stockings* or shoes left before the fire to dry. Hence the custom of children hanging out *stockings* – in the hope of attracting presents of their own from St Nicholas - on Christmas Eve. That is why three gold balls, sometimes represented as oranges, are one of the symbols of St Nicholas.



REMEMBERING THE BOXING DAY TSUNAMI OF 2004

Twenty years ago, on 26th December 2004, the Indian Ocean earthquake and tsunami (also called the Boxing Day Tsunami) took place. A massive undersea earthquake near Sumatra caused a devastating tsunami that swamped coastal areas in Indonesia, Sri Lanka, India, Thailand and East Africa. It was one of the deadliest natural disasters in recorded history, killing more than 230,000 people in 14 countries.

Waves generated by the earthquake and travelling at up to 500mph were believed to have been up to 50ft high in places, and the cost in lives and damage was so extensive because detection and warning systems were relatively primitive, as this was not a prime area for such events. Scientific monitoring and warning plans, led by Australia, have since been considerably improved, but the unpredictability of tsunamis remains a major problem.

The massive surges of water in 2004 swept away buildings and people, and some effects were felt as far away as Somalia on the east coast of Africa, nearly 2,800 miles (and seven hours for the waves) west of the epicentre. Nearer coastlines were hit in as little as 15 minutes.

Aftershocks continued to shake the region daily for up to four months after the original earthquake. The raising of the seafloor reduced the capacity of the Indian Ocean, resulting in a permanent rise in sea level globally by an estimated 0.1 mm.

Since 1900, only two earthquakes have been recorded with a greater magnitude than the Sumatra Boxing Day event. One was in 1960 at Valdivia, Chile (magnitude 9.5) and the other in 1964 in Prince William Sound, Alaska (9.2). Both spawned tsunamis in the Pacific, but the death toll (1655 and 131) was sharply less, because of much lower population density where they came ashore.

CHRISTINGLE, A GENEROUS PRESENT FROM THE MORAVIANS

It is the Moravians whom we have to thank for bringing us the Christingle. Especially one Moravian clergyman: John de Watteville.

No one knows for certain when the word 'Christingle' was first used with regard to the custom. No one even knows where the word 'Christingle' comes from. Some people say it is from the old Saxon word 'ingle' (fire), meaning 'Christ-fire or light'. Another theory is that it derives from the German 'engel' (angel), meaning 'Christ-angel'.

In any event, the symbolism of Christingle gradually developed, until today the Moravians in the British Province use an orange, representing the world, with a lighted candle to represent Christ, the Light of the World. Nuts, raisins, and sweets on cocktail sticks around the candle represent God's bounty and goodness in providing the fruits of the earth. Red paper, forming a frill around the base of the candle, reminds us of the blood of Christ shed for all people on the cross at Calvary.

In Moravian churches, the Christingle Service is usually held on the Sunday before Christmas or on Christmas Eve. The website for the Moravian Church says: "We are glad that the Moravian Church has been able to make this contribution to the wider Christian world."

THANK DICKENS FOR CHRISTMAS AS YOU KNOW IT!

Ever wonder where many of our Christmas traditions come from? A surprising amount of our modern Christmas celebrations can be traced back to the well-loved story of 'A Christmas Carol', by Charles Dickens.

When you read 'A Christmas Carol', you discover almost a template of the 'ideal Christmas' which we still hold dear today. Dickens seems to have selected the best of the Christmas celebrations of his day (he ignored some of the odd excesses) and packaged them in such a way as to give us traditions that we could accommodate and treasure – more than a century later.

So, for instance, in *A Christmas Carol*, Christmas is a family day, with a family-centred feast. In a home decorated with holly and candles the characters enjoy a roast turkey, followed by Christmas pudding. They give their loved ones presents. Scrooge even gives donations to charity (!).

And all the while outside, there is snow and frost, while church bells ring, and carol singers sing, and hope for mulled wine. In 'A Christmas Carol' there is even a Father Christmas – in the shape of Christmas Present. Only the Christmas tree itself came later, when Prince Albert imported 'a pretty German toy' that won the heart of the English court, and hence the rest of Victorian society.

Canon David Winter reflects on the coming of Jesus...

THE MOST BEAUTIFUL STORY

A well-known atheist was being interviewed on Radio 4. When asked how he spent Christmas, he said that he went to Midnight Mass at church. "But you're an atheist", his interviewer protested. "Yes", he replied, "but what they celebrate at Christmas is the most beautiful story ever told."

That 'beautiful story' tells of a Creator who sent His Son to share the life of His creation, to be born as a helpless baby, to grow up as a man of extraordinary wisdom,



gentleness and love, who was executed by the authorities for contradicting the traditions of the time. His followers – who today number about two billion people all over the world – believe that He rose from the dead, and that by His death and resurrection He has made possible forgiveness and eternal life for men and women everywhere.

That is certainly quite a story, perhaps the greatest story ever told, and yes, beautiful. His birth changed history, His life transformed our understanding of what it means to be human, His death was at one and the same time a tragedy and a triumph. Yes, it is 'the most beautiful story ever told'. Enjoy it again this Christmas.

ALL IN THE MONTH OF DECEMBER

It was:

750 years ago, on 25 Dec 274 that the Roman Emperor Aurelian founded the cult of Sol Invictus as an official religion. He erected a temple and declared 25th December a national holiday, to be known as the Feast of the Unconquered Sun. In 336, after the conversion of the Emperor Constantine, 25th December began to be celebrated by the church in Rome as the birthday of God's Son.

500 years ago, on 24th Dec 1524 that Vasco da Gama, Portuguese explorer, died of malaria. He was the first European to reach India by sea.

200 years ago, on 21st Dec 1824 that James Parkinson, British surgeon and politician, died. He was the first person to describe Parkinson's disease, in 1817.

125 years ago, on 5th Dec 1899 that Henry Tate, British sugar merchant and philanthropist, died. He established the Tate Gallery in London.

Also 125 years ago, on 16th Dec 1899 that Noel Coward, British playwright, composer, director, actor and singer, was born. His plays include *Hay Fever, Private Lives*, and *Blithe Spirit*.

80 years ago, from 16th Dec 1944 to 16th Jan 1945 that the Battle of the Bulge (Belgium) took place. German forces launched a surprise assault on the Allies in the Ardennes Forest – their last major counter-offensive operation of the war.

75 years ago, on 13th Dec 1949 that Jerusalem became the capital of Israel, replacing Tel Aviv.

60 years ago, on 31st Dec 1964 that Donald Campbell broke the world water speed record, and became the only person to break both the land speed record and the water speed record in the same year.


50 years ago, on 5th Dec 1974 that the last episode of the TV comedy series *Monty Python's Flying Circus* was broadcast in the UK. It had begun in October 1969.

40 years ago, on 31st Dec 1984 that the Bank of England stopped producing one pound notes. They remained legal tender until 1988.

30 years ago, on 9th Dec 1994 that Sinn Fein held its first formal talks with the British government. This eventually led to the IRA ceasefire, the Good Friday Agreement, and the establishment of the Northern Ireland Assembly in 1998.



THE GROWING MENACE OF SHOP-LIFTING

Christmas shopping this year will be done by two sorts of shopper: those who intend to pay - and those who don't.

And the 'those who don't' category is now so huge that stores across the country have been reporting on average two thefts each and every minute. According to the Office for National Statistics (ONS), that equates to more than 9,000 reported offences a week, or 1,290 a day.



Retailers warn that the crisis adds at least 6p to every store transaction, and the losses stand at £1.8 billion of stolen goods each year, according to the British Retail Consortium. A further £700 million is having to be spent on extra security.

But the police-recorded figures are only a fraction of the total amount stolen, as most shops only report the crime to the police when they catch the offender in the act, or have CCTV or other evidence.
