

MESSAGE FOR FEBRUARY

The January, snow, rain and cloud have made many of us retreat indoors and batten down the hatches. One consequence is that we haven't been able to see the constellation Orion shine majestically in the night sky. Orion is located in the southwestern sky and forms a large rectangle of four bright stars; with a diagonal three-star "belt" at its centre; and a fuzzy luminosity below the belt, which is the great Orion nebula.

That nebula consists of clouds of dust and gas, and stars in the process of formation. The nebula is an impressive sight even through a pair of binoculars, and lies at a distance of approximately 1,350 light years. A light year being the distance light travels in one year as it travels at 186,000 miles per second.

It might be tempting to assume that such huge distances lead all astronomers to reject the notion of God. Not so. Many remain open, curious and some, like the great Isaac Newton said, "God created everything by number, weight and measure". So, although other great thinkers have concluded differently about the relationship between science and faith, it is important to remember that there is a diversity of opinions.

When the February night skies are cloudless, it may do us good to wrap up warm, go outside, and look up at the magnificent night sky. It is an awe-inspiring and wonderful free gift of creation. Three thousand years ago, someone did just that and posed these questions, "Can you direct the movement of the stars—binding the cluster of the Pleiades or loosening the cords of Orion? Can you direct the constellations through the seasons or guide the Bear with her cubs across the heavens? Do you know the laws of the universe? "(Job 38:31-41). Those questions are I believe still pertinent today, and laden with possibility, wonder and faith.



LOCAL HISTORY

Editor's note: This month I am taking an account of John Wesley's visits to our area from a book written by Thomas William Hanson "The Story of Old Halifax" which was written primarily for the boys and girls of Halifax and district with the hope that older people would find it interesting.

"Hoo Hole is in the very centre of the coiners' country, and here on June 28th, 1770, his sixty-seventh birthday, came John Wesley, "one of the makers of modern England," to preach. Two months before – to the day – David Hartley had been hanged, and many of the men of this district were then on bail to appear at York in about another month. It required some courage to preach in such a place. Wesley wrote of his visit in these words: "It was a lovely valley encompassed by high mountains. I stood on the smooth grass before the house, which stands on a gently rising ground, and all the people on the slope before me. It was a glorious opportunity." On one of his early journeys into our district, (May, 1747) Wesley came from Lancashire over the mountain road, passing Widdop, to Heptonstall. At Stoneshey Gate, he had a congregation that filled both the yard and the road. Many were seated on a long, dry wall, and in the middle of the sermon the wall fell down with the persons sitting on it. "Not one was hurt at all," says Mr Wesley, "nor was there any interruption of my speaking, or of the attention of the hearers." During the next summer, Wesley visited Halifax and attempted to preach at the Cross in the middle of Old Market, which caused a great commotion in the town. Mr Wesley said "There was an immense number of people roaring like the waves of the sea, but the far greater part of them were still, and as soon as I began to speak, they seemed more and more attentive." To break up the meeting, a gentleman "scotched" half-pennies among the crowd; then there was confusion, in which stones and mud were flung at the preacher. A few days later Mr Wesley was mobbed at Colne, and he retired to Widdop, from which safe refuge he wrote a remonstrance to the church minister of Colne, who had encouraged the rioters.

Wesley was again at Widdop in 1766, and the rock from which he preached is still known as Wesley's Pulpit. At such places as Widdop, Heptonstall and Midgley, the people became eager to listen to his preaching, and Wesley grew fond of this district. In his Journal, he says that nothing since the Garden of Eden could be more pleasant than Calder Vale, between Todmorden and Heptonstall. He could not conceive anything more delightful than the steep mountains, clothed with wood to the top, and washed at the bottom by clear, winding stream. This is indeed high praise, for John Wesley had seen more of England than any other man of his time. About Hebden Bridge and Eastwood the scenery is still beautiful, though the main valley has been altered much in one hundred and fifty years; however, the glens of the Hebden and Crimsworth still remain unspoiled. Ewood, near Mytholmroyd, was a favourite house of the great preacher – "Ewood, which I still love, for good Mr Grimshaw's sake."

Mr Grimshaw, rector of Haworth and Wesley's right-hand man, had a great influence on the people about Haworth, Halifax and Todmorden. Mrs Grimshaw's home had been at Ewood, and there the two preachers went for rest after heavy days of travelling and speaking.

At Lightcliffe lived a good and interesting lady in a fine old home – Mrs Holmes of Smith House – who was one of the first to welcome John Wesley to our district. To Smith House also came the Moravians – missionaries from Germany – and they established a settlement in Lightcliffe. They built a large, square house (Lightcliffe House) near to Smith House, and they also occupied a house in Wakefield Road, called German House. Later, they made their headquarters at Fulneck.

This great Revival of the eighteenth century had a wonderful effect for good on our country, and our own neighbourhood received its full share of the benefit. In the streets and markets, in the fields and country places, preachers worked hard to make better men and women. Ordinary farmers, colliers and cobblers, took to preaching as well as the regular ministers and small chapels – often in cottages – were started in each hamlet. Baptists and Independents as well as Wesleyans were alive to the new spirit. Some of the chapels of this epoch, like Wainsgate near Hebden Bridge and Mount Zion near Ogden, appear to us to be situated in out of the way places, and it has been suggested that their sites were chosen for their first members to be secure from persecution. The real fact is, that at the time of their establishment, these hilly places were centres of population.

Titus Knight, a collier in the Shibden Hall mines, came under the notice of Mr Wesley, and as he was of a studious and thoughtful turn of mind, the collier was asked to preach and to become a schoolmaster. Mr Knight developed into a famous preacher, but later he left the Wesleyans, and ultimately the large brick Square Chapel was built for him, where he had large congregations

NO PLACE TO PARK

It is often hard to find a parking space. So, a lot of us are taking chances – and getting caught.

As a nation we were handed six million penalty charge notices in 2023 alone, according to recent research by Confused.com, the insurance comparison website.

With 42.3 million driving licences on issue, according to the Driver and Vehicle Licensing Agency (DVLA), this suggests that one in seven drivers received a fine for parking offences in 2023.

Rhydian Jones, a spokesman for Confused.com, said: "If you're unsure whether you can park in a space or not, don't take the risk, even if it's only for a few minutes."

Parking charge notices handed out by local councils can cost up to £100 for parking infringements, although according to Confused.com the average parking fine is £47.

THE CRIME THAT RUNS IN FAMILIES

How many parents team up with their offspring to commit fraud? The answer might surprise you.

Fully Insured

For research has found that nearly one in five young motorists are lying to their car insurers as to who is the main driver of their car.

The practise is called 'fronting'. Young drivers claim that a parent is the main driver of the car, not them. Sometimes the parent knows this has happened; but sometimes they do not.

'Fronting' results in a cheaper insurance premium to pay, but it is insurance fraud, and a very real criminal offence. Anyone who is caught can face a driving ban, having their car seized by the police, and being issued with an unlimited fine.

The reason for 'fronting'? Car insurance premiums for newly qualified young drivers have soared to an all-time high. A 17-year-old who has just passed their driving test faces an eye-watering annual premium of about £3,075.

But the AA urges parents to "have open conversations with their young driver about the importance of providing accurate information when applying for car insurance. By doing so, they can help their children avoid the serious legal and financial repercussions associated with 'fronting' and ensure they are driving safely and legally."

MIDDLE AGED? DON'T SKIP BREAKFAST!

If you skip breakfast in your middle age, it can make you fatter and unhealthy.

Instead, a recent study advises that having a well-balanced breakfast helps manage daily calorie intake and lower cholesterol, BMI and waist size. Breakfast "serves the critical role of breaking the extended fasting period from sleep."

NHS guidelines recommend 2,000 calories a day for women and 2,500 for men. Breakfast should account for a quarter of this: 500 calories for women and 625 calories for men.

The study was carried out at the Hospital del Mar Research Institute in Barcelona.

It disregarded the 'full English' breakfast as being too full of saturated fat levels.

Instead, it recommends cereals, protein, a healthy fat source, fruits and vegetables.

HOW MANY MINUTES OF WALKING MIGHT HELP YOU AVOID A HEART ATTACK?

It seems that keeping your heart reasonably healthy may not take a lot of time.

Researchers at the University of Sydney have found a link between short but intense bursts of activity and a significant drop in heart disease among people who otherwise engage in little activity.

Sedentary women who did just 3.4 minutes of "vigorous intermittent" exercise, such as brisk walking or climbing the stairs, each day, suffered 67 per cent fewer cases of heart failure, with an overall reduction in heart disease of 45 per cent, compared to those not exercising at all.

Sedentary men who did 2.3 minutes of exercise, which could include carrying heavy shopping or heavy garden work, saw an 11 per cent reduction in heart attacks and strokes.

IN PRAISE OF THE HUMBLE EGG

We love eggs. On average, we eat at least two of them each week, which makes eggs one of Britain's most popular foods.

Eggs are exceptionally good for you – high in protein, containing all the essential amino acids, rich in the B vitamins, vitamin D and A, and choline, and a source of healthy fats.

Eggs are also filling, and with 7.5g of protein in less than 80 calories per egg, there are few other foods that can match them for so much protein per gram. They are also inexpensive and easy to cook.

Experts recommend eating one or two eggs a day, and choosing a low-fat way of cooking them, by boiling or poaching. Cooking them in butter is a bit lower in fat than frying them in olive oil. Free-range eggs generally contain more vitamin D.

THE NEW TREND OF CLAPPING IN CHURCH

Some people are beginning to clap in church, if they are pleased with something.

For tired vicars and timid curates, having a sermon greeted with warm clapping might be an encouragement, if also a complete surprise.

But the applauding of sermons, or applause at the end of services, also reveals a dark side: churchgoing has now declined to such a degree in the UK, that even the knowledge of 'how to behave' in church is fading.

That leaves some people unaware that in the UK, aside from a few 'mega churches' where American style singing, dancing and clapping is the norm, applause is not something we 'do' in church.

As one vicar puts it: "I think it has to do with cultural expectations. People are less and less familiar with acts of worship directed to God. Instead, they have a sense of a performance."

DANGER AHEAD FOR BRITAIN'S CANALS

Our historic canals are in danger of disappearing.

Caught in a 'perfect storm' of extreme weather events and funding cuts, the canals could be facing irreparable damage to huge stretches of their waterways. The Canal and River Trust (CRT) warns that even the historic sections of the Grand Union Canal and the scenic Oxford Canal are at risk.

Now the CRT, which is responsible for the upkeep of the country's historic canal network, has launched a major fundraising campaign. Millions of pounds are needed for a programme of replacing ageing lock gates and repairing tunnels and bridges.

The problem is huge because our canal network, dating back to the 1760s, runs for a whopping 2,000 miles, providing a haven for wildlife as well as thousands of jobs along its routes.

But major storms caused almost £10 million of additional repairs to the network in just the past 18 months alone. This included a major landslip involving 4,000 tons of mud on the Oxford Canal, which severed one of the busiest and oldest canals in the country. Then parts of the Grand Union Canal bank and towpath near Leicester collapsed, needing £500,000 of repairs. Elsewhere, dams were breached and other canals flooded.

Meanwhile, the CRT says the money it receives from DEFRA is set to fall by more than £300 million from 2027.

Yet CRT points out: "Britain's ageing canals are a national treasure. They have been re-purposed for modern society for leisure, recreation and for their wildlife, supporting thousands of jobs and the economy and saving the NHS more than £1 billion annually because of the health and wellbeing benefits they bring to millions of people."

ROME BRACING TO WELCOME 60 MILLION VISITORS THIS YEAR

If you like peace and quiet, it is best to avoid Rome this year.

For 2025 is a Jubilee Year for the city, and tens of millions of visitors worldwide are expected to converge on Rome. In all, a staggering 60 million are expected.

As Pope Francis has recently explained: "Once again, Rome will welcome pilgrims from across the globe, as it did in 1300 during the first Church Jubilee." Many religious and cultural events on the theme of 'Pilgrims of Hope' are planned.

The Pope foresees that this year Rome will be a "place of hospitality, a melting pot of diversity and dialogue, a multicultural hub where the world's colours come together like a mosaic. Rome can embody an eternal spirit, rooted in its glorious past yet committed to building a future without barriers, discrimination or mistrust."

The Jubilee tradition harks back to Old Testament Jewish practices. The modern tradition of Jubilee began with Pope Boniface VIII. It was seen as a time of grace, "offering freedom to those imprisoned by sin, resignation, and despair."

The 2025 Jubilee coincides with the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea, as well as a rare common celebration of Easter by all the Churches.

ALL IN THE MONTH OF FEBRUARY

It was:

125 years ago, on 27th Feb 1900 that the Labour Party was founded in the UK.

90 years ago, on 22nd Feb 1935 that US President Franklin D Roosevelt banned aircraft from flying over the White House – because the noise kept him awake at night. The ban remains in place today, but mainly now for security reasons.

80 years ago, on 6th Feb 1945 that Bob Marley, the Jamaican reggae/ska/rock steady singer, songwriter was born. He became a musician and cultural icon (died 1981).

75 years ago, on 8th Feb 1950 that the world's first payment by credit card took place. The founders of Diners Club (now Diners Club International) used it to pay their restaurant bill at Majero's Cabin Grill in New York City.

70 years ago, from 24th Feb 1955 to March that Britain's Big Freeze took place. Deep snow and freezing temperatures caused havoc, with many places cut off. The RAF dropped food and medical supplies to affected areas, while thousands of sheep died from exposure.

65 years ago, on 8th Feb 1960 that the Hollywood Walk of Fame was established in Hollywood. It consists of more than 2,700 stars embedded in the pavement, that bear the names of notable figures from the entertainment industry.

50 years ago, on 11th Feb 1975 that Margaret Thatcher became the first female leader of the Conservative Party. She became Britain's first female Prime Minister in 1979. 40 years ago, on 7th Feb 1985 that the Mayor of New York City, Ed Koch, adopted the song New York, New York by Franck Sinatra as the city's official anthem.

30 years ago, on 16th Feb 1995 that the environmental campaign group Greenpeace discovered Shell's plan to dump its defunct Brent Spar oil rig in the Atlantic. It launched an international campaign to stop it, and the rig eventually was taken to Norway where it was dismantled and part of it were used to extend a quay.

Also 30 years ago, on 23rd Feb 1995 that James Herriot, veterinary surgeon and best-selling author, died. Best known for his autobiographical book All Creature Great and Small, which was adapted into a popular TV series.

Also 30 years, on 26th Feb 1995 that Barings Bank, the oldest merchant bank in London, collapsed after its chief trader in Singapore, Nick Lesson, lost £827 million on unauthorised transactions.

25 years ago, on 11th Feb to 29th May 2000 that the British government suspended the Northern Ireland Assembly, after it failed to strike a deal on decommissioning IRA weapons.

20 years ago, on 7th Feb 2005 that yachtswoman Ellen MacArthur broke the record for the fastest solo circumnavigation of the globe, gaining international renown.

Also 20 years ago, on 14th Feb 2005 that YouTube, the online video-sharing service, was founded. It was purchased by Google in 2006.

10 years ago, on 27th Feb 2015 that Leonard Nimroy, actor and film director, died. Best known for his role as Spock in the Star Trek films and TV series.

For many years, we at Illingworth Moor Methodist Church have supported the annual Shoebox Appeal, filling shoeboxes to be sent to areas in Eastern Europe and some areas of Africa where children & families are suffering as a result of war, famine & natural disasters.

In recent years we have sent boxes via the Teams 4U organisation. I listened to teachers, who as children lived in Sarajevo in the middle of the conflict.


They could not go to school.

ERIC LIDDELL - FROM OLYMPIC STAR TO JAPANESE INTERNMENT PRISONER

Eighty years ago, on 21st February 1945, Scottish athlete Eric Liddell died. An Olympic gold medallist in 1924 at Paris, he had withdrawn from the 100m heat because it was held on a Sunday, and had entered the 400m instead. The story is featured in the film *Chariots of Fire*.

Liddell died in a Japanese internment camp in China, aged 43. He wrote to his wife on the day he died saying he was suffering from a nervous breakdown brought on by overwork, but he was also malnourished and had an undiagnosed brain tumour. Five months after his death, the camp was liberated.

Liddell was born in China to Scottish missionary parents and attended boarding school at Eltham College in South London, where he is remembered as an outstanding all-round athlete "entirely without vanity". He later went to the University of Edinburgh, which awarded him a posthumous degree last year in recognition of his contribution to sport and humanity.

Originally intending to run in the 200m at Paris, Liddell discovered en route that the heats for the event would take place on a Sunday. So, he switched to the 400m- and won in an Olympic record time of 47.6 seconds. "God made me fast. And when I run, I feel His pleasure," he said.

He returned to China the following year and stayed there until his death, apart from two furloughs to Scotland, during one of which in 1932 he was ordained a minister of the Congregational Union of Scotland. He then continued his selfless missionary work, largely as a teacher, in China, where he married Florence Mackenzie, a China-born Canadian. Their daughter Heather died in 2023.

When Scotsman Allan Wells won the 100m gold medal in Moscow in 1980, he dedicated his victory to Eric Liddell.
