MESSAGE FOR MARCH

The first daffodil emerging from winter's cold grip takes my mind back to Portsmouth's Rowan's Hospice. Situated north of the city the hospice provided twelve beds for respite care as well as an active day centre. I was straight out of college and it was a steep learning curve to know how to minister to the two-hundred folk who came to The Rowan's every year.

One day, a man commented on the first daffodils in the garden. He asked if I would wheel him out in his chair so that he could see them more closely. So, the two of us, at different ends of life's journey, stopped and stared in wonderment at this bold, yellow, trumpeting flower swaying in the wind. He knew that this would be his last Spring, so he was making the most of it. Somehow his mortality was sharpening his sense of the present - and this daffodil was a sign for him of beauty, wonder and hope. Without feigned emotion, he leant over and said, "I have had a good life - but I do wish that I had given myself more time to stop, think and be thankful".

The forty days of Lent, which prepare us for Easter, invites us to stop, think and be thankful. Beginning on Ash Wednesday (March 5th) the season is marked by simplicity, abstinence and honest reflection. For some, Lent's language of ashes, dust and contrition may seem punitive and small - almost life denying. However for others, to be reminded of death is not moribund, but rather a spur to appreciate what we have in the here and now.

Lent reminds us of the Psalmist's words, "As for man, his days are like grass; he flourishes like a flower of the field; for the wind passes over it, and it is gone, and its place knows it no more" (Psalm 103).

Such acknowledgment can serve to remind us that life is so finite and precious that we must find time to be still and sense our place in God's infinite creation. So, whether we have experiences of many years of Spring daffodils, or just a few, let's embrace this reflective, life-affirming season of Lent, and sense anew the wonder of our brief mortal span.

LOCAL HISTORY

Halifax Guardian – Saturday, 16th October 1841 Robbery at Illingworth Parsonage

On Monday night or early Tuesday morning some villain or villains broke into the Parsonage House at Illingworth, the residence of the Rev William Gillmor, the incumbent, and secured the following articles with which they got clear off, viz. three dozen of Port and Sherry Wine, a quantity of homemade wines, bottles of Rum, Brandy and Whisky, two German silver dessert and three teaspoons, a silver egg spoon, one Coffee and two Britannia metal teapots, two brass articles belonging to the kitchen, two shirts, a black silk shawl, a large market handkerchief, a blue Mackintosh topcoat and all the bread, meat and cheese in the house. The thieves came in at the yard gates and it is not a little surprising that a large dog which is kept in the yard did not bark. The Rev, Gentleman heard some persons in the house during the night but as it was the washing morning, on which the servants rose very early, he imagined it to be them. The depredators have not as yet been discovered but four suspicious characters broke into the Beershop at Illingworth, kept by a person named Butterworth, between one and two on Tuesday morning, demanding drink and broke a window because they could not obtain what they wanted. The men were well known to Butterworth, but he has allowed them to make the matter up with him. We would have our friends in the outskirts to be well provided with locks, bolts and bars, during the ensuing winter, as the above mentioned robbery is only one of a series of a similar description which have been perpetrated during the last three months.

Halifax Courier - Saturday, 7th January 1854

Thomas Dean, Woolcomber, Ovenden, was fined 12 shillings including costs or three hours confinement in the Stocks, for being drunk and incapable in Westgate, the previous night.

George Farnley, Woolcomber, Ovenden, was charged on the 4th inst. with being drunk. The Constable said about a quarter past one o'clock he met with the defendant asleep in Stannary and it required the assistance of another Officer and a cart to bring him to the Police Office. Fined including costs 12 shillings, or in default of payment to be confined in the stocks for three hours.

Halifax Courier - Saturday, 5th December 1863

On Wednesday, during a pelting rain storm, one of the Ovenden roughs sat in the stocks three hours for Sunday Gambling and yesterday, Friday, a second paid a similar penalty for a like offence. A much heavier penalty is necessary to put a stop to this practice, which is very prevalent in this district on Sundays. When they are taken in the act by an Officer, they often jocosely remark "Oh three hours in the Stocks will settle it".

WHERE IN THE WORLD IS IT MOST DANGEROUS TO BE A **CHRISTIAN?**

The answer is found in the recently published World Watch List. It is Open Doors' annual ranking of the top 50 countries where Christians face the most extreme persecution. This year it is North Korea. Again.

For North Korea has been Number One on the World Watch List almost every year since 2002. In North Korea, if they discover you are a Christian, you could be simply killed on the spot. At the very least, you will be sent to a horrendous labour camp and treated as a political criminal. Very few survive.

The main threat is the dictatorial paranoia of Kim Jong-un. The Kims demand total worship of themselves, and recognising any deity outside of the Kim family is seen as a threat. The country's Communist and post-Communist stance backs their position, making it impossible to gather for worship or prayer. Even secret worship is an enormous risk.

Yet even at this level of persecution, there are still as many as 400,000 believers left in North Korea. They make up about 1.5 per cent of the population.

And, through secret networks outside the country, Open Doors' secret workers are able to help around 100,000 North Korean believers by providing vital food and aid, shelter and discipleship training for North Korean refugees at safe houses in China, and training through radio broadcasting from outside the country.

ALL IN THE MONTH OF MARCH

It was:

175 years ago, on 5th March 1850 that the Britannia Bridge linking Anglesey and mainland Wales across the Menai Strait was officially opened. Designed and built by railway engineer Robert Stephenson, it had to be replaced after a disastrous fire in 1970. *150 years ago, on 7th March 1875 that the French composer Maurice Ravel was born. Best known for Bolero.*

125 years ago, on 28th March 1900 that the British archaeologist Arthur Evans began excavating the ancient city of Knossos, capital of the Minoan civilisation, in Heraklion, Crete. Knossos is regarded as the oldest city in Europe. It was abandoned (unknown reasons) more than 3,000 years ago.

100 years ago, on 21st March 1925 that Murrayfield Stadium in Edinburgh was officially opened.

90 years ago, on 16th March 1935 that driving tests were first introduced in Britain. Three days later, on 19th March, a speed limit of 30 mph in built-up areas was also introduced, under the Road Traffic Act of 1934.

80 years ago, on 24th March 1945 that Operation Varsity took place in Wesel, Germany. The USA, Britain and Canada carried out the largest single-day airborne landing operation in history, involving more than 16,000 paratroopers and thousands of aircraft. Allied victory.

70 years ago, on 11th March 1955 that Sir Alexander Fleming, Scottish bacteriologist died. Joint winner of the 1945 Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine for discovering penicillin

60 years ago, on 8th March 1965 that the first US troops arrived in Vietnam. This marked the beginning of the USA's main involvement in the war.

Also 60 years ago, on 18th March 1965 that Soviet cosmonaut Aleksei Leonov became the first person ever to make a spacewalk.

50 years ago, on 26th March 1975 that the Biological Weapons Convention came into effect. This multilateral disarmament treaty banned the development, production and stockpiling of all biological and toxin weapons.

40 years ago, on 3rd March 1985 that British miners voted to return to work after a year-long strike over pit closures and job losses.

30 years ago, on 2^{nd} March 1995 that the 'rogue trader' Nick Leeson was arrested for his role in the collapse of Barings, Britain's oldest merchant bank. Four days later, on 6^{th} March, the Dutch bank ING purchased Barings, for the nominal price of £1.

20 years ago, on 10th March 2005 that Dave Allen, Irish comedian, died.

10 years ago, on 12th March 2015 that Terry Pratchett, British fantasy novelist best known for his Discworld series, died of Alzheimer's, aged 66.

Also 10 years ago, on 24th March 2015 that the Germanwings Flight 9525 crashed in the French alps, killing all 150 people on board. An investigation found that the co-pilot had deliberately caused the crash. His doctor had declared him unfit to fly due to suicidal tendencies, but he had reported for work anyway.

MANY MILLENNIALS ARE STILL AT HOME

Renting and buying your home is much more expensive than it was 20 years ago. So, no wonder that nearly half a million more young people are currently still living with their parents.

According to the Institute for Fiscal Studies (IFS), the 'Hotel of Mum and Dad' is flourishing, with nearly a fifth of all millennials still at home.

Bee Boileau of the IFS says: "In the last decade and a half, there has been a substantial increase in the proportion of young adults living with their parents. This has occurred alongside, and indeed has been fuelled by, increases in rents and house prices."

There are many advantages to living at home: young people can save more of their incomes, and living at home also provides a shelter for those recovering from bad relationships or redundancy.

Overall, in the 25 to 34 age brackets, men are more likely than women to be living at home (23 per cent compared with 15 per cent). Rates are higher among UK-born young people from Bangladeshi and Indian backgrounds (62 per cent and 50 per cent respectively).

SOCIAL MEDIA IS NOT FOR CHILDREN

Most adults would support a ban on under-16-year-olds visiting social media platforms such as X and Instagram.

Such are the findings of a recent survey. It found that 75 per cent of adults favour the minimum age for accessing social media sites to be raised, from 13 to 16 years old.

The survey was conducted by the More in Common think tank. It reports that support for raising the age level is found right across the political spectrum: 79 per cent of Conservative voters, 75 per cent of Labour voters, 76 per cent of Liberal Democrat voters, and 81 per cent of Reform UK voters

Concern about the effects of social media on young people comes at a time when tech giants are facing increasing criticism about the impact their platforms can have on young people.

The survey also found that 71 per cent of adults want a ban on all smartphones in school, while 14 per cent oppose the idea.





A LENT REFLECTION

For us, Lent is an opportunity to hold up a mirror to ourselves and ask the question, *'who am I?* It's a season of honest encounter with who we are, what we've done, and how we should live. What will we see when we hold up the mirror to ourselves? Keeping Lent, the 40 days running up to Easter, could mean taking time to read Scripture, studying a Christian book or spending five minutes each day in silence! We might fast by missing one or two meals, refraining from TV, alcohol, social media, or scrolling on our phones. All of these can help us to give more attention to God in our lives.

Whatever we do, Lent is a season for self-reflection, as we put ourselves in a position to receive afresh the forgiveness and healing that God offers.

POPE CALLS ON JOURNALISTS TO LOOK FOR GOOD NEWS

The Pope has urged journalists to look out for 'good news' stories among so much doom and gloom in global media coverage.

His call came during a gathering in Rome of media professionals from around the world that included an audience with Pope Francis.

The Pope said, "I encourage you to discover and make known the many stories of goodness hidden in the folds of the news, imitating those gold-



prospectors who tirelessly sift the sand in search of a tiny nugget."

His words come as increasing numbers of people are turning away from news coverage, describing it as "depressing, relentless and boring" according to a recent global survey.

Almost four in 10 people worldwide said they sometimes or often avoid the news, up from just under three in 10 in 2017, according to the report by Oxford University's Reuters Institute.

To counter this, the Pope urged journalists and other media professionals to be 'communicators of hope' in a world where divisive disinformation abounds.

Pope Francis, who heads the world's estimated 1.4 billion Catholics called on all those involved in communications "to focus on beauty and hope even in the midst of apparently desperate situations" and to work to generate "commitment, empathy and concern for others."

He said: "Too often today, communication generates not hope, but fear and despair, prejudice and resentment, fanaticism and even hatred."

The message also, perhaps, had criticism for the power and influence being wielded by Big Tech companies, such as Elon Musk's 'X', and Meta – that recently announced it was removing fact-checkers from its US operation.

He said, "In these our times, characterised by disinformation and polarisation, as a few centres of power control an unprecedented mass of data and information, I would like to speak to you as one who is well aware of the importance – now more than ever – of



your work as journalists and communicators."

He called on journalists to communicate hope, noting that "The hope of Christians has a face, the face of the risen Lord." His gift of the Holy Spirit "enables us to hope even against all hope, and to perceive the hidden goodness quietly present even when all else seems lost."

A TRIBUTE TO ALEXANDER FLEMING

Seventy years ago, on 11th March 1955, the Scottish bacteriologist Sir Alexander Fleming died. He was joint winner with Ernst Boris Chain and Sir Howard Walter Florey of the 1945 Nobel Prize in Physiology/Medicine for discovering penicillin.

Fleming was not the tidiest researcher, and his discovery of penicillin came about more or less by accident, as he said himself. He regarded his earlier discovery of lysozyme, a mildly antiseptic enzyme which is present in body fluids, as his best scientific work.

The discovery of penicillin was much more significant in practical terms, but for some years he was unable to persuade fellow-experts of its importance – another example of the scientific consensus being wrong. In the end Chain and Florey were vital to its success, having discovered a method of turning penicillin into a practical, useful treatment.

Fleming came from a Presbyterian background but was described as "not particularly religious". He served through the First World War in the Royal Army Medical Corps, working in battlefield hospitals in France, where he observed that closed wound treatment often had adverse effects.

He was a member of the rifle club at his medical school, St Mary's, which led to his joining the research department there.

The discovery of penicillin and its subsequent development as a prescription drug marked the start of modern antibiotics. Fleming was knighted in 1944. In 1999 he was named in *Time* magazine's list of the 100 most important people in the 20th century, and three years later as one of the 100 Greatest Britons in a BBC poll. He was also voted third greatest Scot in 2009.

When he heard that penicillin production had been patented in the US in 1944, he was furious that his discovery, given free, should become a profit-making monopoly in another country.
