DOES YOUR TEENAGE DAUGHTER FEEL 'SAFE' IN SCHOOL?

A recent study has found that as many as one in three teenage girls do NOT feel safe in school, which is a significant increase since lockdown.

What is called 'declining emotional engagement' among secondary school girls has become a 'pressing issue' for the English school system, says a report carried out by the International Association for the Evaluation of Educational Achievement (IEA).

The research also found that, since the pandemic, pupils in secondary schools in England have fared worse than pupils in many other countries, as far as engaging in school life again.

A pupil's emotional engagement refers to their enjoyment of school, the quality of their relationships with their peers and teachers, and the extent to which they feel safe and that they belong in the school.

LOCAL HISTORY

Editor: Once again this month I am indebted to Sue Johnson (Local Historian) for providing me with information written by the late Mary Dixon.

BRADSHAW SCHOOLS IN THE 19th CENTURY

In 1815 Elizabeth Wadsworth of Holdsworth House, Holmfield (which at one time was the Cavalier Country Club) decided that she would give a sum of money to build a school so that the poor children of the area could receive education. She had land and income from farms which she owned, so she took some of the money from the land which she owned at Northowram and built a school at Popples. The school and the schoolmaster's house are still there. It stands across the road from the row of shops in School Lane.

Miss Elizabeth Wadsworth must have been a very good and nice lady. She kept a diary of things she did and where she went, and who came to see her. You can still read part of Elizabeth's diary as they have been reprinted in the Halifax Antiquarian Societies Paper. There was no reason why she should spend her money to provide a school, but we must think that she liked children although she had none of her own.

The first schoolmaster was William Sutcliffe, and he taught the 30 or so children all in the one schoolroom attached to his house. Not all children could go to school, only the lucky few. The others got what teaching they could from parents, and had to work from a very early age. There were not many schools in the area, at this time, the only other one being Mr Greenwoods School at Illingworth. As time passed on and Miss Wadsworth grew older, she began to think about the time when she would die, and she decided that she would get some other people to help her to arrange a charity which could carry on the work. So in 1832 "The Elizabeth Wadsworth Charity" or "Popples Charity" as it is sometimes called was formed. It had 7 trustees, one of whom was the then Vicar of Halifax, The Rev. Charles Musgrave. The trust was established to:-

- 1. Help to spread religious knowledge amongst young and old.
- 2. Further the education of Boys and Girls in Holmfield.
- 3. Help Poor Women and Spinsters of the district.

In 1840, behind the school six almshouses were built at a cost of \pounds 534, and they are still there, and occupied and the Elizabeth Wadsworth Charity still looks after them. There are now only 4 houses after modernisation.

The most famous of the schoolmasters was Mr William Henry Sutcliffe who was appointed in 1866. He was actually born in the School House, as his father was schoolmaster before him since the year 1831. There was an enquiry in 1891/5 on Halifax Charities and it was stated that the salary of Mr Sutcliffe was £20 per annum, plus the school fees, plus the use of the house (rateable value £12 per annum).

When the school was built, it was a single room with a stone floor. It was well lighted and it had a stove. By comparison with other schools at the time it compared well with the grim conditions of the private and charity schools of the day.

The children were taught the following subjects according to the syllabus of 1894/95: Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, Geometry, Euclid, Bookkeeping, English grammar, Analysis, Composition, Geography, English History, Scripture, History, Physiology, French and Drawing. As Miss Wadsworth had laid down, the "Children should be instructed in religious knowledge, as inculcated by the Church of England" she also required that the girls should be taught knitting and plain sewing. Mr Sutcliffe's wife and daughter taught these subjects. There were still 25 scholars at the school in 1894. On the death of Mr Sutcliffe (about 1896) the trustees decided that the school should be closed, and in 1897 a scheme was approved by the trustees whereby the educational funds were applied to the provision of school prizes and scholarships. That was the end of Popples School as an educational establishment, but there are still the almshouses and the trustees who administer the trust. The Vicars of Bradshaw and Illingworth are still trustees.

In the early part of the century Sunday Schools were built, and many of these also served as day schools for the poor children who could not afford the fees for private schools or be fortunate enough to have a place at a charity school. It was said at the time that "it helped to keep the children off the streets when the factories were closed"? One of these schools must have been Mount Zion Chapel which was built in 1773. It was also known at that time as Bradshaw Chapel. John Wesley visited it in 1774 and preached what is thought to be his last sermon there in 1790 when he was aged 87. We shall hear later how important Mount Zion was in our story.

In about 1811 the Church of England became more interested in providing educational facilities and Andrew Bell established "The Church of England Society for the Education of the Poor." These were known as Bell Schools, and by 1815 there was one in Halifax.

The non-conformists and supporters organised the British and Foreign Schools Society, and they built a school in Halifax in 1818. It was in Albion Street, near where the Laura Mitchell Clinic now stands. From about 1830 the Government started to help the schools by providing money, and by 1856 the sum that they spent was £173,000 for the whole country. The next big step forward came when the Education Act of 1879 which was introduced by a great reformer called W E Forster who decided that it would set up School Boards to collect money from rates and provide elementary education. The first School Board in Halifax was elected on January 16th 1871, and there were 11 members. The Town Clerk at the time was appointed Clerk to the Board until on April 6th the same year the board appointed Mr Robert Ostler to be its clerk at a salary of £200 per annum. This was a great step forward because in the area was an organisation which could start building new schools and set the standards of education in the area. It didn't yet mean that all children were forced to go to school but the time was coming when all children had to go to school. The school board also examined the charity and private schools in the area to see that the accommodation and teaching was up to a certain level so that they could qualify for a grant. Voluntary Schools as they were called had 6 months to bring themselves up to the standards required. The Board also had another big problem. It had so many children wanting to come to its schools, it had to start to build some new ones very quickly, and it was because of this that Bradshaw Board school as it was then called, came into existence.

FAITH OF THE NORTHERN SAINTS EXPLORED IN A SHORT FILM

The power of the Lord's Prayer is celebrated in a new short film that is part of the Archbishop of York's current 'Faith in the North' initiative.

JET LAG IS WORSE WHEN YOU TRAVEL EAST

Do your holiday plans involve travelling from west to east this year? Then prepare yourself for some sleep disruption, while your body adjusts.

A recent study at the Centre of Sleep and Cognition at the NUS Yong Loo Lin School of Medicine in Singapore has found that travelling east can really



impede your body's natural 'sleep timing'. This is because you are in effect 'losing time'.. and that runs in opposition to your body's natural circadian rhythm, or body clock.

In plain speak, this means you may find it hard to fall asleep in conformity with your new local time zone. It can take more than a week to adjust, if you have travelled east across multiple time zones. Men and women are affected the same, though the old are slightly less affected than the young.

ALL IN THE MONTH OF JUNE

It was:

250 years ago, on 15th June, George Washington, who would become first President of the USA, became the Army's Commander-in-Chief. This army would defeat the British army, and America would declare independence the following year, on 4th July 1776.

175 years ago, on 24th June 1850, that Herbert Kitchener, the 1st Earl Kitchener, was born. This Irish-born British Army officer and politician became Secretary of War during WW1, when he appeared on an iconic poster asking people to join the army. He was killed in 1916 when his ship was hit by a German mine.

125 years ago, on 25th June 1900, that Louis Mountbatten, 1st Earl Mountbatten of Burma, was born. He became Governor-General of India (1947-48), First Sea Lord (1955-59), and Chief of the Defence Staff (1959-65). Assassinated in 1979 by an IRA bomb planted on his fishing boat.

90 years ago, on 1st June 1935, that driving tests became compulsory for all new drivers in Britain.

75 years ago, on 3rd June 1950, that the first successful ascent of Annapurna in the Himalayas was made. It was a French expedition and the first successful ascent of a mountain over 8,000 metres. Annapurna is the tenth highest mountain in the world.

65 years ago, on 28th June 1960, that the Six Bells Colliery disaster took place in Monmouthshire Wales. 45 coal miners were killed by a gas explosion.

50 years ago, on 7th June 1975, that the first Cricket World Cup to be held in England began.

Also 50 years ago, on 18th June 1975, that the first North Sea oil was pumped ashore to Britain.

40 years ago, on 2nd June 1985 that UEFA banned all English football clubs from playing in European competitions following the Heysel Stadium disaster of 28th May. The ban was lifted after five years.

30 years ago, on 25th June 1995 that Ernest Walton, Irish physicist died. He was the first person to split an atom.

25 years ago, on 10th June 2000, that the Millenium Bridge opened in London. It closed for a while two days later, when it was found to sway uncomfortably when people walked in step.

15 yeas ago, on 28th June 2010, that the US Supreme Court ruled that American citizens have the right to own a gun, regardless of which state they live in. The right is protected by the Second and the Fourteenth Amendments. There are an estimated 393 million privately owned guns in the USA, and about 340 million people.



Illingworth Cricket Club

What a busy time. The cricket season has got off to a great start in prolonged warm and dry conditions, so dry that regular watering of the wicket has been necessary causing extra work for ground volunteers and extra expense for the club but it is completely necessary.

The senior teams, men and women have had positive starts to the season as have our three junior teams. The 1st XI, after a sticky start to the season losing by seven runs at home to Oxenhope, are getting into their stride with two consecutive wins and are up to sixth position in the league and have progressed to the Quarter Finals of the Parish Cup after beating both Bridgeholme and Great Horton. My life may not be perfect but I am blessed. David Pickup, a solicitor, considers what might happen to your Facebook page when you die.

WHAT ABOUT FACEBOOK AFTER YOU DIE?

The righteous perish, and no one takes it to heart; the devout are taken away, and no one understands that the righteous are taken away to be spared from evil. Those who walk uprightly enter into peace; they find rest as they lie in death' (Isaiah 57:1-2 NIV)

What happens to our Facebook page when we die is probably the last thing on most of our minds. However, many people have an 'online presence' such as Facebook pages, Linked-in, email accounts, Instagram and all sorts of bank accounts and



website pages. Who can get access to that information?

Depending on the type of account, a relative or friend might want to close it, retrieve information or images or preserve it in some way. Making a Will is an opportunity to make a clear decision about what happens to things you own, and this includes something electronic and who carries out your wishes.

According to Facebook, you can choose to either appoint a legacy contact to look after your account, or have your account permanently deleted from Facebook. If you do not choose to have your account permanently deleted, it will be memorialised if Facebook are told about the death. Memorialised accounts are a place for friends and family to gather and share memories after a person has passed away.

Google encourages people to think about these issues and they have something called an Inactive Account Manager to let them know who should have access to your information, and whether you want your account to be deleted.

They recognise that many people pass away without leaving clear instructions about how to manage their online accounts. They work with immediate family members and representatives to close the account of a deceased person where appropriate. In certain circumstances they may provide content from a deceased user's account.

The best advice is to think carefully and make choices about what happens in the event of your passing, and carefully select someone you trust to do this. As ever this is a light-hearted introduction and if in any doubt get proper advice. Different companies have different policies and procedures so always check carefully.

IS THEFT IN THE UK SPIRALLING OUT OF CONTROL?

Have you had your phone stolen yet? 'Snatch thefts' of mobile phones rose from 58,000 in 2023 to 99,000 in 2024 – that is a staggering 70 per cent increase *in one year*.

Meanwhile, overall thefts from people, such as having had bags, phones and other items stolen from under a table or desk or locker, soared by 50 per cent – to 483,000 in 2024.

As for shoplifting, it is now at epidemic levels, with offences passing half a million in 2024. That is the equivalent of more than two shoplifting offences *each minute*, based on an average store's opening hours of 10 a day.

Psalm 55 describes it all very well: 'I see violence and strife in the city...they prowl about on its walls; malice and abuse are within it...threats and lies never leave its streets...But you, God, will bring down the wicked.'
