

#### **JULY & AUGUST MESSAGE**

In the Bible at the tail end of St Paul's letter to the church in Rome he signs off by sending greetings to 27 people. It is kind of first century social media group. Now a list of 27 names may sound as exciting as a bowl of dish water, but stay with me for a few minutes.

Some are men and some are women; some are partners like Aquila and Priscilla; some are single; some are young while others appear to be in the autumn of life; some are related to each other; and others are related to each only through the love of God that bound them into a new family. Some are Jewish in origin, others are Gentile. They seem to come from a variety of backgrounds and economic social status. It is reminder that church has always been, and always will be a place where a wide variety of people come together and find that all are equal.

Then in that list is one of the great surprises of the New Testament. St Paul had someone who he called Mum! He writes, 'Greet Rufus, and his mother who has been like a mother to me'. Isn't that great! St Paul, had someone who was like a mum to him. She could probably say things to Paul that no one else could. She could look at him with a glance of the eye, read him like a book and just "Oh Paul, what have you done now". But all the time, he knew that she was on his side, supporting him in practical ways and remembering him in her prayers.

This list of names in chapter sixteen is a roll call of ordinary people who do the right thing. Theirs is a story of grace and courage, of people who braved the storm and kept the faith. They are St Paul's support group, his back up team, the people on whom he relied.

I wonder who is on your list of supporters? And maybe over the summer you might like to get in contact, just as St Paul did, and say thanks for their faith and kindness.

Gracious God, thank you for all those who walk alongside us in life and support us. Amen



#### LOCAL HISTORY

*Editor:* Once again this month I am indebted to Sue Johnson (Local Historian) for providing me with information written by the late Mary Dixon.

The Halifax Guardian on Sept 1st 1877 wrote the following:-

#### Bradshaw - The New Board School

The school was opened on Monday morning last, when Mr Hanson and Mr Sykes, members of the School Board attended, and Mr E B Turner the schoolmaster commenced his duties.

Though it has not been generally known, there were few children attended the opening. On Tuesday Mount Zion School was closed and the children were transferred to the new board school. Mount Zion Sunday School was built in 1887.

What was the village of Bradshaw like about this time? To find out we have to consult directories of the time. In the directory of 1874 we read that it was "A straggling village in the township of Ovenden. Here are three mills for the manufacture of worsted goods, and two earthenware manufactories. St Johns Church was built in 1838, and Rev. Morgan is the incumbent. Population returned with Ovenden. Post Office at Joseph Rouses."

A list of occupations shows how many trades were carried on in the village, which shows what a close knit community it was.

If you wanted to go to Halifax you either walked or went on the carrier's cart, or if you were fortunate enough to own a horse you went on horseback. The main occupations of the people in the 1840/50 period were farming, mining, handloom weaving. One of the most important pits was Shugden Head, which is near the present Bradshaw Bus terminus. Many of the names of the roads, like Mucky Lane (now Perseverance Road) Colliers Row, and Black Castle all indicate that mining was a chief occupation. As the coal ran out men became unemployed, and many men tried to get work in the towns. The population in 1851 was 3195 but dropped to 2171 by 1861 and to 1941 in 1871. Many cottages became empty and the village people became poorer and poorer. Eventually in 1853 Mr John Lassey a property owner in the area called a meeting of the men in the village, and gave them some land to build a mill. The mill which was called Co-operative Mills, and now known as Bradshaw mill was commenced. The stone laying ceremony was on June 5th 1854 and was attended by some 3000 people, and there were scenes of great rejoicing, and the Queensbury Brass Band came. A lot of people had given money for the project and became shareholders. They went to the Golden Fleece Inn then kept by Mr Henry Spencer where they had a good meal. In June 1855 an accident occurred while the mill was being built. One man was killed and another escaped. The chimney

was twice blown down when a severe gale swept through the district in February 1855, and this resulted in the building being made stronger. Soon the mill was built and completed and on 5<sup>th</sup> November 1855 another celebration was held. The cost had been £7,000. Mr Spencer of the Fleece Inn again provided a dinner for 108 men and women shareholders. Flags were flown and Union Jacks appeared everywhere. At the celebrations Mr John Percival, a sergeant in the West Yorkshire Yeomanry spoke about the Boar War, and the Charge of the Light Brigade and the war against Russia. Another speaker said that the work of the company was an honour to Bradshaw and saved it from becoming a deserted village. The mill was eventually closed for the last time on Sept 29<sup>th</sup> 1967 and at the time 70/75 work people were employed. In 1970 the mill chimney was lowered by 30 feet.

Another event of 1878 was of great interest to the people of Bradshaw, for that was the year of the completion of the railway form Halifax to Queensbury. It went through a cutting at Holmfield and through the hillside. If you go down to Holmfield you can still see the old railway bridges, and where the old railway station was. This would be a great timesaver for the people of the area because they could get to many parts of the country from their nearest station. When the tunnel was built it was a feat of engineering and if you walk up the hillside on the opposite side to the school you can see the air shafts which are now filled in or capped.

Another school in the area was Raggalds Inn school which stands behind the Raggalds Inn on Roper Lane. This was founded in 1831 by Michael Stocks of Northowram. It is now converted into a house but it retains some of its old character.



# BANANAS COULD BE LOST TO CLIMATE CHANGE, CHRISTIAN AID WARNS

Bananas are in danger. Almost half of the world's banana-growing regions may be lost to climate change in the next 50 years, a new report has warned.

Bananas are the world's fourth most important food crop globally — but rising temperatures, droughts, and fungal infections are threatening where most of the world's crops grow, in Latin America and the Caribbean.

A recent study by Christian Aid found that 80 per cent of global banana exports come from this region, but that 60 per cent of the land currently used for the crop will be unsuitable, due to climate change, by 2080.

The director of policy and campaigns at Christian Aid, Osai Ojigho, said: "Bananas are not just the world's favourite fruit, but they are also an essential food for millions of people. We need to wake up to the danger posed by climate change to this vital crop."

UK consumers eat more bananas than any other European country, eating on average about 85 bananas a year each.

Don't Step on a Bee Day highlights the crucial role bees play in pollination, and also that their populations are declining, because of habitat loss, pesticides, and climate change.

If you want to help the bees, here is what you can do:

*Plant Bee-Friendly Flowers*: Grow a variety of flowers in your garden that attract and support bees, such as lavender, sunflowers, and marigolds.

Avoid Using Pesticides: Reduce or eliminate these in your garden, to create a safer environment for bees.

*Support Local Beekeepers:* Purchase honey from local beekeepers, to help support sustainable beekeeping practices.

*Create a Bee Bath*: Place a shallow dish of water with stones in your garden to provide bees with a safe place to drink.

*Educate Others:* Share information about the importance of bees and how you protect them with friends, family, and on social media.

#### ALL IN THE MONTH OF JULY

It was:

175 years ago, on 2<sup>nd</sup> July 1850 that Robert Peel, Prime Minister (1834-35, 1841-46) died. He founded the Metropolitan Police Service and is seen as the father of modern British policing.

125 years ago, on 2<sup>nd</sup> July 1900 that the premiere of Finnish composer Jean Sibelius's tone poem *Finlandia (Opus 26)* was given in Helsinki.

100 years ago, on 21st July 1925 that racing driver Malcolm Campbell became the first person to travel at over 150 mph. He set a new land speed record of 150.87 mph at Pendine Sands in Wales in a Sunbeam 350HP. He also went on to break the 250 mph and 300 mph records, in 1932 and 1935.

90 years ago, on 6<sup>th</sup> July 1935 that the Yangtze River flooded in China. 145,000 people died, while millions were displaced and suffered food shortages and famine.

80 years ago, on 5<sup>th</sup> July 1945 that WW2 leader Winston Churchill lost the General Election to Clement Attlee's Labour Party.

75 years ago, on 5<sup>th</sup> July 1950 that the Law of Return was passed in Israel. It granted all Jews the right to immigrate to Israel.

Also 75 years ago, on 11th July 1950 that the first episode of the BBC children's TV show *Andy Pandy* was broadcast in the UK.

70 years ago, on 16<sup>th</sup> July 1955 that Stirling Moss became the first British driver to win the British Grand Prix.

Also 70 years ago, on 23<sup>rd</sup> July 1955 that racing driver Donald Campbell broke the world water speed record and became the first person to break the 200-mph barrier at Ullswater in Cumbria.

65 years ago, on 9th July 1960 that US President Dwight D Eisenhower and Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev traded threats over the future of Cuba.

40 years ago, on 13<sup>th</sup> July 1985 that the two Live Aid concerts were held simultaneously in London and Philadelphia, as well as at other venues such as Sydney and Moscow. They raised millions of pounds for famine relief in Africa.

30 years ago, on 16th July 1995 that Amazon.com first opened its website to the public.

25 years ago, on 25<sup>th</sup> July 2000 that an Air France Concorde crashed outside of Paris, shortly after taking off for New York. It killed all 109 people on board, along with four people on the ground.

20 years ago, that the 7<sup>th</sup> July (2005) London bombings took place. The coordinated series of four suicide bomb attacks on London's transport system during the morning rush hour killed 56 people and injured more than 700. It was the worst-ever terrorist attack on Britain, and the country's first attack by suicide bombers.

10 years ago, on 14<sup>th</sup> July 2015 that NASA's New Horizons space probe, launched in 2006, completed the first-ever flyby of the dwarf planet Pluto, and returned close-up photos.

What a busy time. The cricket season is gathering momentum with an incredible amount of activity throughout

the club both on and off the field.

The senior teams, men and women have had positive starts to the season as have our three junior teams. Junior training takes place on Friday evenings from 6.30 pm. All Stars Cricket has also started. It is all part of a fun Friday Night project on every Friday night into the Summer starting from 6.30 pm until 7.30 pm for 5-11 year olds designed to introduce both girls and boys to cricket and lots of other games and good exercise. Mums and Dads, Grandparents and friends are all welcome to come along and watch. The bar will be open so adults can enjoy a quiet drink at the same time.

Off the field there is always plenty going on.

We are delighted that Sam Fellows has been selected for the England Indoor Cricket U17 squad to take part in the World Series in Sri Lanka in October, a great honour for both him and the club. A Racing Night was held in the club recently which raised over £1,000 to help him and his family meet the cost of going on the trip which should be an amazing experience for a young cricketer. #### WORLD IS MORE VIOLENT THAN EVER

Last year there was serious conflict in at least 50 different countries.

"The level of violence happening is certainly at one of its highest levels since the Second World War." So says the founder of ACLED (Armed Conflict Location and Event Data).

Some experts estimate that at least one in every six people is exposed to some level of conflict. This can range from civil war in Myanmar to warring drug cartels in Mexico, with "fewer conflicts being resolved, either militarily or through peace agreement", according to the Global Peace Index.

The increase now is largely due to the military coup in Myanmar in 2021, the Russian invasion of Ukraine in 2022, and the Israel-Hamas War, which began in 2023. These conflicts have been responsible for more than half the war fatalities recorded in 2024.

The only place that exceeded Myanmar on the index was Gaza, which ACLED reported to be the "most dangerous and violent place in the world in 2024".

Jeremiah the prophet, who lived in 600 BC, also knew about violence. He observed with sorrow that: 'Death has climbed in through our windows and has entered our fortresses; it has removed the children from the streets and the young men from the public squares.' (Jeremiah 9:21)

#### FINDERS KEEPERS? - FINDING THINGS IN THE STREET

The gospels have a number of stories about things lost and found. The lost sheep, the prodigal son, and one of my favourites - the lost coin. I wonder if Our Lord had someone in mind when He told that parable? Perhaps He had seen a lady searching high and low, turning the house upside down - could it have been His mother, Mary? Just a thought.

I am always losing things myself; usually essentials like glasses and keys and once my wife. We got separated from each other in a museum in Germany. I spoke to a warder who took me to a room where all the CCTV cameras were, and I was invited to select a wife. In the end, to get her back, I had to make an announcement over the tannoy.

I am also always finding things. Maybe it is because I look downwards all the time. I have found keys, a wallet, a suit jacket, bank cards and a bobble hat on a train. The suit jacket was on a train so I could easily tell the guard. The wallet was outside a station in the drop off zone and I just handed it in. Things lost in other places are best handed to the police station. There they will take down your details and if not claimed they can give it back to you.

If, like me, you often lose things, it is sensible to be careful. Do not put your pin number with bank cards. It is probably not a good idea to keep documents in your car that could be traced to you. Do you have a separate note of important telephone and other numbers if something is stolen? Do not put your address on your key tab.

The bobble hat is another story. It was left on a first-class carriage and I could remember the man and where he was sitting. I gave a full description of the man, the seat and which train he was on to a lady at enquiries at Newcastle station. I do not think it was ever claimed. Between you and me, I suspect he has spent much of his life trying to get away from it.

# 15TH JULY - ST SWITHUN (OR SWITHIN), SAINT FOR A RAINY DAY

St Swithun is apparently the saint you can blame for rainy summers. It is said that if it rains on his special day, 15<sup>th</sup> July, it will then rain for 40 days after that. It all began when Swithun was made Bishop of Winchester in 852 by King Ethelwulf of Wessex. It was an important posting: Winchester was the capital of Wessex, and during the 10 years Swithun was there, Wessex became the most important kingdom of England.

During his life, instead of washing out people's summer holidays and damping down their spirits, Swithun seems to have done a lot of good. He was famous for his charitable gifts and for his energy in getting churches built. When he was dying in 862, he asked that he be buried in the cemetery of the Old Minster, just outside the west door.

If he had been left there in peace, who knows how many rainy summers the English may have been spared over the last 1000 years. But, no, it was decided to move Swithun. By now, the 960s, Winchester had become the first monastic cathedral chapter in England, and the newly installed monks wanted Swithun in the cathedral with them. So finally, on 15 July 971, his bones were dug up and Swithun was translated into the cathedral.

That same day many people claimed to have had miraculous cures. Certainly everyone got wet, for the heavens opened. The unusually heavy rain that day, and on the days following, was attributed to the power of St Swithun. Swithun was moved again in 1093, into the new Winchester cathedral. His shrine was a popular place of pilgrimage throughout the Middle Ages. The shrine was destroyed during the Reformation and restored in 1962. There are 58 ancient dedications to Swithun in England.
