

DECEMBER / JANUARY MESSAGE

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God" (John 1:1).

This is one of the central truths of the Christian faith — God's eternal Word, became flesh and blood in the person of Jesus Christ. This mystery is at the heart of what we believe about who Jesus is.

For ancient philosophers, the concept of *Logos* — or "the Word" — was an abstract rational principle that held the universe together. John takes this idea and gives it radical new meaning. The Word isn't just some distant concept; it's a person. Jesus is the Word made flesh. Jesus is the God who spoke the *universe* into *being*, now living among us as a *human being*.

God becoming human is a a radical, mind-blowing idea. Why would God do such a thing? The answer lies in God's love for us. God didn't want to remain distant or far away. God longs for relationship with us and so enters into our world — not as a king in a palace, but as a humble baby, born in a stable. Jesus' entire life, from birth to death upon the cross, was a powerful act of love. God was not content with merely telling us of their love, Jesus demonstrated it as the Word made flesh.



LOCAL HISTORY

Editor: I have taken this account of Christmas from Arthur Porritt's book 'It Happened Here' published in 1959

A VERY QUIET CHRISTMAS

The last Christmas of 1899 was said to have been very quiet, and there were two reasons to account for it. One was the South African War, which was demanding a flow of men to swell the ranks of the Volunteers, and which, we are told, "eliminated a lot of the usual jubilation and hilarity." Another was the snow for it was a real snow-white Christmas the most severe for a number of years. Snowbound and icebound, the people of Halifax had their blood quickened by the icy winds; the streets were traversed with difficulty, and in the outskirts there was nothing visible but snow. The hills were lost to view.

But all this does not seem to have deadened the life of the town, nor to have prevented the population from attending the many entertainments provided during the "quiet" Christmas festival. The brass bands played about the town and the carol singers braved the snow. At the new infirmary, the fever hospital and the workhouse the sick and the poor were cheered and entertained and given their Christmas dinner; and the places of worship had their carols and their "Messiah."

There was a circus in the new Public Hall, with its series of sensational equestrian turns, twice daily on Christmas Day and Boxing Day. The Drill Hall, too, was crowded on those two days, and on New Year's Eve and New Year's Day, for the "finest entertainment yet given" by the Aeolian Opera Company on their many annual visits. Twenty talented artistes presented gems from the comic operas, assisted by some popular Northern humorists. At the Mechanics' Hall a Grand Christmas Carnival opened on Boxing Night for the week. The show included the latest life-size living pictures - the new animated pictures that became the cinematograph. There were the usual nightly performances at the Mitre Music Hall in Market Street, with three afternoon shows on Monday and Saturday.

And while these lively entertainments were flourishing so were the two Halifax theatres. At the Grand Theatre and Opera House the Moody-Manners Operas Company on the Sunday, which was Christmas Eve, presented a sacred concert, its best principals being the soloists. On Christmas Day the company gave a special performance, including a full costume selection from "Maritana."

The pantomime"Aladdin" had opened there on the 20th, following a week of the play, "The Orphan Heroine," several well-known artists entertained at a carnival concert on Christmas Day, and a dramatic play occupied the rest of the week.

Such was the quiet Christmas of 1899. One is left wondering what those festive days would have been like if they had not been quietened by the wartime limitations!

ALL IN THE MONTH OF DECEMBER

250 years ago, on 16th Dec 1775 that Jane Austen, novelist (*Sense and Sensibility, Pride and Prejudice, Mansfield Park, Emma, Northanger Abbey, Persuasion*) was born. Over 30 million copies of her books have been sold, 7,000 of them in her lifetime.

175 years ago, on 4th Dec 1850 that William Sturgeon, physicist, electrical engineer and inventor died. He created the first electromagnets and invented the first British electric motor.

150 years ago, on 6th Dec 1875 that Evelyn Underhill, writer and pacifist was born. Best known for her books on religion and Christian mysticism.

80 years ago, on 27th Dec 1945 that The World Bank, the International Monetary Fund, and the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development were founded. They had been created at the Bretton Woods Conference in July 1944.

75 years ago, on 25th Dec 1950 that the Stone of Scone, the coronation stone of British monarchs, was taken from Westmintser Abbey in London by four Scottish students.

They transported it to Scotland but broke it. It was later returned to London and used in the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II. Since 1996 it has been kept in Edinburgh Castle, with the agreement that it will be transported to Westminster Abbey when needed for coronations.

70 years ago, on 1st Dec 1955 that African American civil rights activist Rosa Parks refused to give up her bus seat to a white man in Montgomery Alabama. This violated the city's racial segregation laws, and led to the Montgomery Bus Boycott (5th to 20th Dec 1956) and the birth of the modern American civil rights movement.

Also 70 years ago, on 20th Dec 1955 that Cardiff was proclaimed the capital city of Wales.

65 years ago, on 9th Dec 1960 that the first episode of the TV soap Coronation Street was broadcast on ITV.

60 years ago, on 22nd Dec 1965 that Richard Dimbleby, journalist and radio-television broadcaster, died. The BBC's first war correspondent, he was one of the greatest figures in British broadcasting history. Father of the TV presenters David Dimbleby and Jonathan Dimbleby.

40 years ago, on 2nd Dec 1985 that Philip Larkin, poet, librarian and jazz critic died. Also 40 years ago, on 7th Dec 1985 that Robert Graves, poet novelist, critic, translator and classical scholar died. Best known for *I,Claudius*, and *Goodbye to All That*.

30 years ago, on 22nd Dec 1995 that the British 'rogue trader' Nick Leeson was jailed for six and a half years in Singapore for fraudulent financial dealings which had led to the fall of Barings Bank.

Also 30 years ago, on 8th Dec 1995 that Headteacher Philip Lawrence was stabbed to death outside his west London school while trying to protect a student who was being assaulted by a gang of youths.

25 years ago, 13th Dec 2000, that George Bush finally claimed the US presidency, 36 days after the election was held. The results were delayed by disputed votes in Florida. 15 years ago, on 16th Dec 2010 that Ireland was granted a 67.5 billion Euro bailout from the European Union to rescue its banks and other financial institutions from collapsing. 10 years ago, on 19th Dec 2015 that Jimmy Hill, football player, manager and host of the BBC football TV series Match of the Day (1973-88) died.

ELDERLY AND DEPRESSED THIS WINTER? GO TO CHURCH.

Older people with depression can see a bigger improvement in their mental health if they start going to church than if they engage in charity work or sport.

Research from the London School of Economics found that joining a religious organisation is the best way of combating depression. It may be both that having a faith gives benefit, and also because meeting up with other people of faith gives a sense of belonging. The LSE also found evidence that membership of some political and community organisations may have a poor impact on an older person's mental health.

HOW TO CARE FOR YOUR REAL CHRISTMAS TREE

If you want your tree to last as long as possible this year, the following should help:

Cut off about half an inch from the bottom of the trunk. This opens the pores of the tree. Then place it outside in a cool shaded place, standing in water until required.

Once you have brought it in, place it in a water-holding stand, well away from direct heat such as radiators. Top up the container every day – you will be amazed how much water the tree drinks. These ideas come from the British Christmas Tree Growers Association (BCTGA)

SAFE DRIVING THIS WINTER

The temperatures are dropping now, and it is a good idea to nurture your car battery. Cold, damp weather can make it as reluctant as you are to get going in the morning.

The RAC recommends the following to take best care of your battery: Before you switch off your engine at the end of a journey, turn off the lights, wipers and heaters. This prevents any unnecessary drain on the battery next time you start the car.

Check that everything is switched off before your turn on the ignition. Avoid using the heater longer than necessary, as it puts high demands on the vehicle's battery.

Check that you don't leave interior lights, satnavs or phone chargers connected. If possible, park in a garage.




